

July the 23 1852 Friday

Commences with a fine breeze from the S.W. saw
treiches at 4 P.M. called them jumpers the
latter part of the day somewhat equally

Lat 31° 28' N Long 45° 35' W

July the 24 Saturday

Commences with a light squalls of wind and
rain at 10 o'clock saw spots off weather low but
they went to the windows so we could not make out
what they were very large the latter part of the
day very squally Lat 30° 09' Long 45° 36' W

Sunday the 25 1852

Commences with light breezes the latter part of the
day had a fine sailing breeze from the E
Eastwardly steering W. B. W. the day well

Lat 31° 27' N Long 48° 13' W

Monday the 26 This day commences
with good breezes from the North West steering
W. at 3 P.M. saw the seafox bound westward
With all sail set the day end with a strong
breeze from the S.W. heading North Westward
To end this day Lat 31° 05' Long 49° 57' W

July the 27 1852

Commences with a light breeze from S & E steering
By the wind men employed in laring down the head
Rigging and turning in the jib and of flying jib eyes
And setting them up the day ends with light breezes
From the S.E. Lat 31° 16' N Long 48° 05' W

Tuesday the 28

Commences with a
breeze hurricane a dead calm men employed in
laring down the main rigging at 5 A.M. saw a
school of grampases at 10 A.M. saw a merchantman
went along close to us Lat 31° 31' N Long 49° 30' W

Thursday the 29 This day commences with a
light breeze from all particular all directions
Saw several sails the day ends with a light breeze
Westward steering by the wind, Lat 31° 11' N

Friday the 30 This day commences with a
light breeze from the westward steering full and by men
Employed in ship duty such as pointing guns and
Running rigging there is 9 sails in sight the day ends
with a light breeze from the westward steering
By the wind Lat 31° 45' N Long 51° 30' W
