AUGUST 24th This day commences
 With light breeze from S.E. several sails
 in sight at 9 P.M. saw Blackfish and
 hoared away 3 boats and chased them come
 On board at 1 P.M. skunked the day
 Ends well no W. Long

AUGUST Wednesday 25th
 Commences with a light breeze from the
 Eastward steering by the wind at 3 P.M.
 Spoke the D. Franklin of Wiscasset, Maine
 2 P.M. the day ends with a light breeze
 from the S.E. Lat 36-44 Long 37-00

AUGUST Thursday 26th 1852
 This day commences with a light breeze from
 the S.E. steering to the eastward by the
 Wind 12 P.M. saw Porpoises got one. This
 with a light wind from the N.E. steering E
 Lat 36-44 Long 37-22

AUGUST Friday the 27th
 Commences with moderate breeze from S. steering
 E At 3 P.M. raised a spout of small whales at 2
 Past 3 lowered away and soon Mr. Warner got
 a chance at a small cow. Whale the harbord
 boat fastened lightly but drew me took him along
 side and cut line in before dark latter part of
 The day are employed in boiling spoke the Brig Esther
 Of Orleans Hopkins 2 month out had seen nothing

 boiling out blankets no could down at 3 P.M.

 Breeze heading S.E. by E at 7 P.M. raised a
 Spout supposed it to be grampuses saw
 Several sails at 4 P.M. bowed for blackfish
 The waist boat got one the Harbord boat got
 Fast killed one but in his flerray he shook
 The iron out and sunk like a stone the latter
 Part of the day men employed mincing our fish
 And stow down oil Lat 37 Long 37 04
