M. to head wind and steered at N by N at 7 1/2 shortened sail one sail in sight. Made past a light
house from N by N at 8 by S and thick weather headed from N by N at 10 to 12 E at midnight
wore ship and headed from S by S to S by E at day light made sail and steered S by E. latter
part calm and foggy saw five hawks

Remains on board Friday, Nov 11th 1934

First part a fine breeze from S.W. to W.B.W. and foggy steered from N.W. to W. saw fine
barks and frigates 4 sails in sight at 7 P.M. Margaret sail a little part a light breeze from
W.B.W. to W. fine weather heated from N.W. to S.W. Later part of N.W. to B. fog and
cloudy with some fog at 10 P.M. light made sail and cruised about looking for whale saw
fine barks at 9 P.M. spoke the Bark Alexander Mansfield of Hudson with one right
whale 3 more sails in sight at 9 spoke the Julius Caesar of New London with 100000
s. C. Lake out for beef and beans. Lat by 45° 30' N. Long 155° 30' W.

First part of the forenoon a light breeze from N.W. by W. to W. S.W. and pleasant at 1 P.M. saw a right whale going quickly to the westward but off but did not come up with it. At 2 P.M. came on board tasked about for the whale at 3 P.M. spoke the crewing of New Bedford with 3 right whales at 4 P.M. shortened sail. Middle part a moderate breeze headed N.W. by W. Latter part a fresh gale at N.W. by E. and cloudy at day light ^{put} the main sail fore top sail and jib and let the reef out of the main top sail and staved ^{off} the off at 10 A.M. took 2 reef in the fore top sail and 1 in the main top sail at 11 P.M. put the shrouds at 9 P.M. saw a fin-back at 11 P.M. saw a right whale going quickly to windward but did not lower 2 sails in night.

Remarks on board Tuesday Nov 21st 1859

First part a light breeze from N. by E. and pleasant steered from S. by E. to E. sails in sight let
the reefs out of the top sails and set the main top-gallant sail saw five backs and one right
whale going fast did not lower at 4 P.M. shortened sail spoke the Comor of Chas. Comford no
clothes ship and named C. W. Marble part a strong gale a thick weather at mid night wore ship cast anchor
the main top sail took in the fore sail set the fore spencer and lie to head S. by E. Letter part a hard
gale thick and raining lie to head from S. by E. wind from N. by E. at 10 P.M. took in the main but
one sail in sight

Where 24 hours commenced with a hard gale strong thick and rain, the head of the ship was in the main top-sail and fore-top-mast stay-sail and set the main top-sail close, it was the wind shifted N. E. W. set the fore-top-mast stay-sail and lowered the fore-top-sail for the fresh gale at N. E. W. and clear at day light with a double reefed fore-top-sail fore-sail, jib and spanker and stone reefed out of the main-top-sail 2 sails in sight saw five black birds S. E. W. at 7 o'clock let the reefs out of the fore-top-sails set the main-sail and main-top-gallant sail at 5 o'clock set the fore-top-gallant sail to a square Obs. Lat. 49° Obs. 50° 15' Long. 71°

Remarks on board Hurstons Nov 20th 1857

First part a fresh gale from N. by E. and clear steered S. W. to W. both in the top gallant
sail wore ship and steered from N. by E. to S. by E. 2 sails in sight saw porpoises at 10. We took one
up in the main top sail and two in the fore top sail at 12. took in the main sail five top sail jib and
spanker. hauled out a fresh gale from N. by E. to W. steered from S. by E. to N. by E. 2 sails in sight
a fresh gale at 11 and clear with a heavy swell at any sight set the main sail double reefed fore top sail
jib and spanker and steered at N. by E. one sail in sight at 12. took out of the fore top sail
at 10. let the reef out of the main top sail saw five backs black fish and porpoises at 11. at 12. saw
4 right whales put off with 4 boats but did not come up with them at noon came on board

Remarks on Lord Bute's Speech Nov 24th 1769

This day commenced with a fresh gale from N. by E. and clear with a heavy swell running from N. N. W. to N. E. saw 12 hawks at 6 AM were ship and steered S. by E. spoke the bark Roscoe of New Bedford with 1 right whale and 5000 lbs. sperm oil were hauled and steered S. by E. shortened sail. Middle part a strong gale of N. by E. and heavy rain. At 1 PM took in the jib at very light sail the main sail on double reef for top sail and took in the fore-top sail in light. Latter part a strong gale now clear with a heavy sea running saw fin-back at 4 PM took in the main sail at 8 PM took in the fore-top sail at 11 PM took in the main-top sail and headed off
Left by bark Chas. 06 1/2 AM

Remarks on board Saturday Nov 25th 1839

First part a strong gale cloudy and rugged with some rain headed off under West gate wind N.W. 19th. Well sail
went from N.W. 18th. Weather calm well headed flag off at 10 P.M. The boat went light breeze
13 Wind pleasant with a blow well at day light. To main sail jib and double reef fore top sail at
at the reef out of me top sail at 6 feet to sparker a main top gallant. I am let the reefs
the fore top sail now left up. Boat ran fine back and forth.
