This day begins with a strong breeze from W. with clear and cold weather. Latter part more moderate brought of the natives that arrived yesterday about 10 A.M. and met us at 2 P.M.

Thursday Apr 18th

This day begins with a heavy gale from N.W. and the air thick with drifting snow. Middle part the wind shifted to N. and blew heavy for awhile towards it moderated and cleared up.

2-B

Friday Apr 19th

This day begins with a strong gale from N.E. with clear weather. Latter part calm and cloudy.

11-B

Saturday Apr 20th

This day begins a strong gale from N. and thick snow storm. Latter wind N.W. and snow still continues.

11-B

Sunday Apr 21st

This begins with a strong breeze from N. with clear weather. Latter part strong breeze from N.W. and clear.

9-A

Monday Apr 22nd 1842

This day begins with a light S.W. wind and hazy weather. Latter part light air from S. and pleasant weather. Employed painting boats 2nd coat and putting up provisions for the Blue Whaling.

1-A

Tuesday Apr 23rd

This begins light wind from N.E. and pleasant weather. Latter part light breeze from N. and cloudy. Employed overhauling the lines and receding them and repairing old sails in the blubber room.

7-A

Wednesday Apr 24th

This day begins with a fresh breeze from N. and cloudy. Employed mending old sails. P.M. light breeze from N.W. and pleasant weather. Turned over the boats and riged the for whaling.

1-A

Thursday Apr 25th

This day begins with a strong gale from N. At 10 A.M. by order of Mr. Miller and a boat crew went down to the N.E. end - dug the snow out the houses and bought an old stove to repair arrived to the ship at 2 P.M. Latter part blowing heavy from N.W.

12-A
