Remarks on board Mon Feb 20th

At 11 PM Broke out for a raft of water casks coopered them and sent them on shore. At 11 PM had the lobster traps in on deck repaired them and sent them out and set them up. Last evening a Kanacka fell down the fore-castle steps and hurt his shoulder and was complaining of it paining him through the day and after we had done work the Kanacka went a swimming and the Kanacka that had hurt his shoulder was not able to get up the ship's side without help and commenced to complain bitterly of his shoulder and I examined it and concluded it was out of joint and took him on shore and the captain took him to the doctor. A Kanacka named Hearaka did not come on board when the liberty was ended.

Remarks on board Tues Feb 21st Let off 41 barrels of water and stowed the most of it on shore. The barboard watch on shore on liberty. These 24 hours all night rain with a fresh wind at 2 PM let go the starboard anchor

Bark Globe of Bedford N^o Handy Master at the

Town of Puget Bay of Island. Remarks on board Tues Feb 22nd 1854
At 11 AM hove up the starboard anchor and filled a raft of water & M brought of from shore nearly five tons of coney gum to be frated to new Bedford. 2 Kanacka absented themselves These 24 hours the weather cloudy with a fresh breeze from S.W.

Remarks on board Thurs Feb 23rd 1854

At 11 AM The barboard watch a shore on liberty and brought off about 2 bushels of shellfish a kind resembling charchoys called by the natives pepe. also brought off a raft of water containing 49 barrels. This morning caught the 2 Kanacka that run away yesterday. At 11 PM stowed the coney gum below. First part of these 24 hours rainy latter part cloudy a fresh breeze from S.W. The Bark Comd Peuple of Linn arrived at this port

Remarks on board Thurs Feb 24th

At 11 AM hoisted 5 barrels of oil on deck and got 22 barrels of shellfish and 2 barrels of peaches. At 11 PM sent the 5 barrels of oil on shore and brought off 26 pounds of lived pork. The weather lowering with a light breeze from S.W.

Remarks on board Saturday Feb 25th

At 11 AM hoisted 2 casks of oil on deck containing 7 barrels or thereabouts there was no gaging rod in the ship nor any gages on the casks we carried them on shore also 2 small oars and a small fluke knife. Got 1/2 barrels of beef and one barrel of pork from Ship Washington. At 11 PM also got 2 casks of bread from her. At 11 PM hove short and loosed the fore-top-sail at 3 the pilot came on board and at 3 PM broke ground with the anchor and got underway at 5 o'clock the captain came on board with two of the men that had runaway. I do not know these Kanacka names but one of them we call John Heakaahua the other Peter at 6 the pilot left us with a head wind at 6 PM we took a shore breeze and squaired the yards at 7 PM one of the runaway Kanacka that was brought on board 2 hours before jumped overboard we immediately come to the wind and lowered a boat and went in pursuit of him and when we had pulled as far as we thought he was we stopped pulling and he hailed us a little to the wind ward and we directed our course towards the hail and he came swimming towards us and we picked him up and carried him on board and kept the ship off and stood on our course out of the bay. The Kanacka said that he did not jump over board but fell overboard but I think no man in the ship believed him. The captain kicked him down the cabin and struck him several times after having done and kicked him in to the run.
