

Barge Globe of New Bedford Capt William Handy

Sunday the 28<sup>th</sup> 1854 the first part of these hours squally blowing strong from the West & heading S by West carrying all prudent sail to keep from land at 4 p.m. close reefed the top sails middle part blowing heavy in squalls at 2 a.m. the wind increased took in the fore top sail & at 3 hauled up the main sail & furled it & at 5 a.m. we were obliged to take in the foresail the wind from the same quarter blowing very heavy & also a very heavy sea on we are lay in under close reefed main top sail fore & spencer & fore top mast stay sail so ends these 24 hours

Monday Augt the 29<sup>th</sup> 1854 the first part of these hours blowing heavy from same quarter with thick & rainy weather at 4 p.m. began to moderate a little at 6 p.m. set a reefed fore sail & main sail middle thick & rainy wind about West heading S.S.W. moderating gradually latter foggy foggy at 6 a.m. turned one out of the fore & main top sail likewise the fore sail & main sail at 7 began to back up & the sun showed herself at 9 a.m. got an altitude which gave her some 20 miles further to the West than we judged we were so ends these 24 hours

Tuesday Augt the 30<sup>th</sup> 1854 the first part of these hours foggy & broken with quite moderate steering S by E at 4 p.m. saw a sail to the leeward at 6 p.m. the wind hauled to the Nrd & West & blew up fresh squared in the yards middle strong breeze from the Nrd & West thick & rainy weather at 12 kept her of S.S.E. latter part the weather the same strong Norther at 6 a.m. took in main top gallant sail & double reefed the top sails course the same so ends these 24 hours

Wednesday Augt the 31<sup>st</sup> 1854 the first part of these hours squally rainy weather steering S.E. by S at 2 p.m. began to moderate at 3 turned out one reef from the main top sail & set the main top gallant sail middle thick & rainy the wind & course the same latter thick & drizzly weather with a good breeze from the Nrd & West at 7 a.m. altered her course to East by N for the digges set main sail & at 8 set the fore top mast standing sail and turned the reef out of fore top sail & so ends these 24 hours three men of duty & forth

Passage from Palcahuano to New Bedford kept by D. H. Storer

Thursday Sept the 1<sup>st</sup> 1854 the first part of these hours fine breeze from the N.W. foggy and drizzly weather at 8 p.m. more broken the moon showed herself occasionally wind freshened steering E. by N the middle quite strong and equally at 11 going 9 knots by the log took in the fore top mast standing sail main top gallant sail double reefed the topsails furled jib & main sail latter part more moderate at 4 a.m. turned one reef out of the main top sail at 5 set the main top gallant sail turned out one reef from the fore top sail at 6 had quite a heavy squall wind the same course E.N.E. after breakfast made all sail and got an altitude so ends these 24 hours

Friday Sept the 2<sup>nd</sup> 1854

The first part of these hours fine breeze from N.W. steering E.N.E. at 4 p.m. began to snow the wind light at 8 kept her E. at 12 luffed up E. at 12 middle strong and squally took in main top gallant sail and double reefed the fore top sail furled main sail and jib at 2 a.m. kept her E. with a strong breeze going 9 knots by log latter part clearer weather at 6 luffed her E.N.E. at 10 began to moderate turned out one reef out of the main top sail set the main top gallant sail turned reefs out of the fore top sail & set the mainsail a merchant brig in sight & so ends these 24 hours

Saturday Sept the 3<sup>rd</sup> 1854 the first part of these fine and pleasant with a moderate breeze from West N.W. steering N.N.E. at dark the brig in sight at 10 p.m. the wind headed her off E. & took ship and stood to N.W. & at with a light breeze steering by the wind middle moderate & pleasant weather at 2 a.m. luffed & stood to the Northward and E. & at 4 latter wind and weather the same at 6 broke out for water so ends these 24 hours

from Palcahuano up to this time kept by astronomical account through a mistake on account of this we pass the Sunday in order to keep sea account Monday Sept the 4<sup>th</sup> 1854 the first part of these hours fine moderate weather light breeze from the Nrd heading W. by N.W. at 2 p.m. saw a Barge steering made the land bearing N. by W. & upon distant land middle calm and air from the Nrd and West steering N. by E. latter the wind and weather the same steering the same N.N.E. so ends these 24 hours
