

Barque Globe of New Bedford Capt William Handy

with a severe pain in his right side wind and water the same blowing a gale with hale squalls cald so forth morning watch we ship a sea stove in her monkey sail and started several planks from her kil works & so ends these 24 hours

Wednesday Sept the 13th 1854

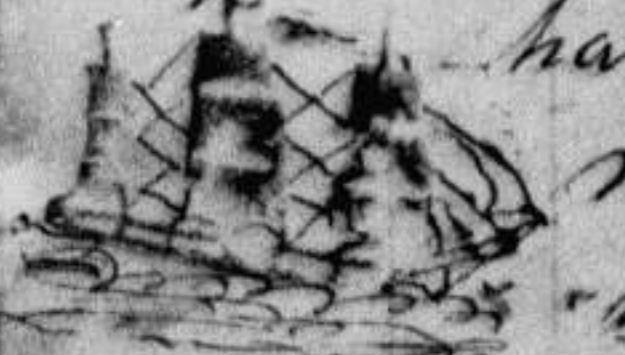
The first part of these hours blowing heavy from the Srd and Wstrd Capt Handy very sick at 7 p.m. began debark a little and we gave the main top sail close reefed and reefed fore sail and kept her of Nth at sun set abarque in sight laying to under her spencers middle part thick and squally the wind heavy in squalls with hale Later the wind from the same quarter at 9 a.m. ^{gave her} hove fore sail and double reefed fore top sail and turned out one reef from main top sail Capt Handy more comfortable course Nth there is 6 of the crew on the sick list and so ends these 24 hours



Thursday Sept the 14th 1854 the first part of these hours strong breeze from the Srd and Wstrd and squally but not so heavy at one p.m. tamed another reef out the main top sail and set the main top gull sail at 2 gave her hove fore top sail and mizzen top mast stay sail & at 6 p.m. lifted up Nth by E. wether cloudy moderating fast middle fine moderate breeze from the same quarter set the main sail and spanker and mizzen top mast stay sail latter fine pleasant wether the wind and course the same set the studing sails & forth ^{saw schooner bound to the Srd} Capt Handy more comfortable so ends these 24 hours

Friday Sept the 15th 1854 the first part of these fine moderat wether the wind to the Srd and Est rd after dinner we raise the 3 masted schooner under ^{the} wether under wether from Philadelphia 60 days and bound for San Francisco i lowered the larboard boat went on board to get some medical aid but had no physician on board we got a little medicine from her and a few late papers capt bitter at 5 1/2 the wind halled to the Est rd raised up the spars and took in the studing sails middle strong breeze from the E. strd steering Nth latter part thick and rainy from 4 a.m. till 10 a.m. broken the winds baffling heading from Nth to N.W. Capt Handy about the same so ends these 24 hours

Passage from Talcahuano to New Bedford by J. G. Bates

Saturday Sept the 16th 1854 the first part calm at 2 p.m. a squall came up after which we had a light breeze from the Srd and Est rd steering Nth by Est set the fore top mast studing sail at sunset the wether quite mild middle calm and light air from Est to Nth with ^{N by E} rain latter fine pleasant wether with a moderate breeze from the Srd course ^{N by E} employed fitting the fly jib boom and rigging and like wire fore top gullants rigging Capt Handy about the same saw Brigg standing to the Srd and so ends these 24 hours

Sunday the 17th 1854 the first part of these hours fine pleasant wether the wind to the Srd steering N by E. it being in sight we sent the fore top gullant mast in end and crossed the top gullant yard bent the sail and set it fly jib boom all ready the crew all on duty except cook who has been on duty about 10 days since we left port middle calm with some sail. Latter light breeze from the Nrd heading E.N.E. painted the waist boat & forth Capt Handy about the same so ends these 24 hours

Monday Sept the 18th 1854 the first part of these hours mild and light at 12: stacked ship and stood to the Nrd and Wstrd at 2: taked a gain and headed from E.N.E. to N by Nth middle wether fine with fresh breeze from the Srd steering N.E. by Nth going 8 not by the log latter part strong breeze from the same quarter course the same N by E. at from 6 am we took our potatoes on deck and sorted them done some jobs in the rigging & forth Capt Handy the same so ends these 24 hours

Tuesday the 19th 1854 the first of these hours fine wether the wind from the Srd and Est rd steering Nth by Est after dinner we passed morpholite bigg bound to the Srd the she showed her long 49.32 ours was 48.56 we put our potatoes below again after again they were dry cleared the decks and after 4 washed off and sorted middle part fresh breeze from the Est rd took in the studing sails and brace the yards steering Nth latter part the wind from the same quarter and course the same wether cloudy saw a bigg bound to the Srd Capt Handy about the same so ends these 24 hours
