

Barge Glob of New Bedford Capt William Handy at Bathing

Friday Oct the 6th 1854 the first part of these hours fine at 8 o'clock i saw mr Gonsalves and he told me that he could not clear the ship today so i asked him if he could the next day and he said he could so i got a quater of beef and sent proctor down with the boat and ordered him to come up the next day employed on board at jobs in the rigging so ends these 24 hours

Saturday Oct the 7th 1854 the first part of these hours fine i went and told mr Gonsalves that i was in a hurry to get away he wanted to what use it was for me to say what i wanted he said he could not clear the ship in my name untill he had writings to that effect from Capt Handy so i went and saw him and asked him about it and he told me that had it wrote for some days so he sent it to mr Gonsalves i then went to mr Gonsalves again and he told me that he could not do any thing today proctor came up with the boat and i sent him back again and told him to not come up again and some orders to maston & so ends this day

Sunday Oct the 8th 1854 the first part rainy with the wind to the Nrd in the afternoon some of the men went on shore with cloudy wind the same so ends these 24 hours

Monday Oct the 9th 1854 the first part Capt Handy made his mind to go in the ship so he sent for mr Gonsalves and him to clear the ship in his name so i asked mister Gonsalves if he clear the ship today he said he might clear the ship out but he could not with all the bills he said also that the bread would not be ready with fine wind to Srd employed on board some sugar from shore and articles so ends these 24 hours

Tuesday Oct the 10th 1854 the first part of these hours fine with the wind to the Srd i went to mr Gonsalves office and signed the papers mr maston went on board of the enterprise and got two pieces of beef and so forth and the coffee from burbanks at 8 o'clock mr Gonsalves told me that every thing was ready except Capt Handys Doctors bill and so ends these 24 hours

Wednesday Oct the 11th 1854 the first part of these hours fine with the wind to the Nrd i went and saw Capt Handy and he told me i better hire a boat and take the bread and other things and go down to the ship so i got a boat and started for the ship and when i got about one 3rd of the way down i was forced to put back on account its being so rugged i found that i should spoil the bread if i went any further arrived at the city again at about 3 o'clock took the things and put them in the store employed on board in the duty took on board 3 cases of water and so forth the started from her anchor and dragged some distance

Thursday Oct the 12th 1854 the first part of these hours fine with the wind light from the Nrd Capt Handy started at 8 o'clock for the ship i got my things into the launch and at 2 o'clock started down arrived about dark the launch came alongside and delivered the bread and other small stores mr maston took anchor and caged her of shore & so ends these 24 hours

Friday Oct the 13th 1854 the first part of these hours fine high breeze from the Srd i sent the boat to the fort for the Custom house officer to come on board and take the seals off the hatches i then took a boat and went round to pier grand and got a boat load of wood and some eggs and fowls after dinner William Cook came aft and asked me if he and some of the rest of the crew might go on shore on liberty for a few hours i told that i had no orders to that effect he could not go presently Charles Damm came aft and wanted know what the reason was why they could not go on shore and i told him the same he allowed that they were entitled to liberty and ordered him forward at 2 o'clock

painter came aft and wanted to see the Capt so i took him on to the cabin he asked Captain Handy for liberty and he told him that the ship was ready for sea and that he should not give any liberty at half past 2 the most of them came aft and stated that they would not take anchor untill they had liberty the steward also stated that he would not do any more duty and at 6 o'clock i took a letter from Capt Handy on shore to the consulate so ends these 24 hours

Saturday Oct the 14th 1854 the first part cloudy with the wind to the Nrd and Estd at 9 o'clock the conseil set ensign i took the boat and went on shore Capt Seth Card asked me if Capt Handy was able come on shore i told him that he was not so he told that the customs of the port that he was so that he could not come onboard without a permit from the custom house he told me to go onboard and bring those men ~~onboard~~ that were dissatisfied onshore i then went onboard and told Capt Handy he then came on deck and told me to call all hands aft he then told them those that refused to take the anchor to go on the harborside there seven that refused he then told me to them on shore to the conseil and i did so Capt Seth Card asked them what their troubles were and they told him they wanted liberty he had a long talk with them and he told them that they were not entitled to one hours liberty unless the Capt saw to give it to them he also told them that ~~that~~ made no expence so they said they would go onboard and do their duty i then took them onboard again the wind strengthened and at 8 o'clock about 4 o'clock it began to rain and so ends these 24 hours
