Sunday Nov the 5th 1854 the first part fine the wind light from E.N.E. steering by the wind set up the head stays & fore top gall rigging & back stays finished ~~the~~ rattring down the fore top mast rigging & middle fine & pleasant heading S.S.E. & S. latter part squally & rainy at 10 am died away calm at 11 breezed up clear from E.N.E. heading E.S.E. by Sth & ends then 24 hours

Monday Nov the 6th 1854 the first part clear fresh breeze from N.N.E. heading E.S.E. by Sth saw a school of porpoises middle fine wind & course the same latter part fine pleasant weather at 6 started the works to haul out the black fish & so ends then 24 hours

Tuesday Nov the 7th 1854 the first part fine clear weather the wind light from E.N.E. heading S.E. by the wind at 3 p.m. coiled down the works at 5 saw a school of cow fish & put 7 heading E.S.E. at 10 p.m. tacked ship heading N.N.E. with fine wind light latter fine pleasant weather the wind light from the same quarter at 10 a.m. tacked ship heading S.S.E. by the wind employed in the rigging fitted the cap on the bowsprit & forth so ends then 24 hours

Wednesday Nov 8th 1854 the first part fine pleasant weather wind light from the E.S.E. employed in the rigging after 4 p.m. broke out on cask of water chard up the decks & saw a ship & brigg steering to the Srd & Wrd at 8 p.m. tacked ship heading N by E. Sth middle fine pleasant weather the wind light from the E.S.E. at half past 12 tacked ship heading S.E. by Sth ~~two~~ filled 8 bls & an odd of black fish oil a 105 galls or there abouts at daylight five sails in sight from mast head employed in the rigging and so ends then 24 hours

Thursday Nov the 9th 1854 the first part of these hours fine weather the fresh from the Wrd heading E by the wind at 3 p.m. a large merchant ship crossed our bow and showed his numbers we also set our ship signal employed in the rigging rattled the larboard side of the fore rigging & middle fine & clear the wind and course the same latter part pleasant weather the wind fresh from the N.N.E. heading E.S.E. by Sth employed in the rigging 3 sails in sight 2 briggs & one ship so ends then 24 hours

Passage from Zabalmano to New Bedford by D. M. Baker

Friday Nov 10th 1854 the first part fine & pleasant weather the wind light from N.N.E. heading E.S.E. by the wind employed in the rigging at sunset 3 sails in sight 2 briggs & a barque steering by the wind middle fine wind & course the same latter part fine at 12 a.m. tacked ship heading N.W. employed in the rigging m & mason finished rattring down the main & mizzen rigging the larboard side so ends then 24 hours

Saturday Nov the 11th 1854 the first fine & pleasant weather employed rattring down fore rigging stopping hooks taring and so forth at 5 tacked ship heading E by Sth at half past 6 p.m. passed a barque merchant man to the leeward steering to the N.W. at 7 p.m. tacked ship heading N.W. by Nth middle mild & pleasant weather the wind & course the same saw a sail to leeward at 2 a.m. latter part fine fresh breeze from the N.E. heading N.N.W. by the wind saw a whale ship to the leeward steering to the Srd & Wrd & two merchantman on barque steering by the wind the same as our selves employed fitting rigging took our potatoes on deck and sorted them and so ends then 24 hours

Sunday Nov the 12th 1854 the first part fine weather the wind light from the N.W. heading N.N.W. by the wind a merchant barque to the leeward steering by the wind saw a large blipper ship steering to the Srd & westward after 4 p.m. wet hole & started a cask of water middle fine wind & course the same latter strong breeze from the same quarter & flowy at day light breezed on strong took in fly fift main top gall sail & put two reef in the fore & main top sails the barque still in sight passed 3 merchant ^{man} bound to the Srd so ends then 24 hours

Monday Nov the 13th 1854 the first part of these strong breeze from the Wrd & E.S.E. heading N.N.W. our company keeper still in sight off the lee bow at 5 p.m. turned one reef out of the main top sail after set the main top gall sail & turned one reef out of the fore top sail middle strong breeze from the same quarter at 2 a.m. took in the main top gall sail latter part strong & flowy spent down the fore top gall yard & mended the sail and so ends then 24 hours
