

Ship Alfred Gibbs. At Stanley Falkland Islands.

Remarks Monday Continued. July 30th 1866. 398
Boaring S. S. W. Dist 2 miles. Under ship and
got the anchors off. at 8 were on again. and stood
in for the land. at 10^{1/2} made it. Dist One mile.
very foggy. at noon came to anchor in Stanley Harbour.
in four fathoms water. near abreast of the watering place.
at 5 P.M. commenced to draw on. at 9^{1/2} the
ship started her anchors and dragged ashore on soft
bottom. Dredge in East.

Remarks Tuesday July 31st 1866 399
Begins with a Gale from the N. N. W. at 6 A.M.
at full tide hove the ship off. and came too
anchors again. the anchors appeared to be checked
with tussack of grass. the bottom appears very
sticky. it was calm when we hove off. at 9 A.M.
began to blow on again. last part a Gale.

Remarks Wednesday August 1st 1866 400
Fresh Breezes from N. N. W. and thick.

Remarks Thursday Aug 2nd 1866 401
Fresh Gales from the E. S. E. and raining. at 6 P.M.
Mr. Shannon a foremast hand stole a boat from along
side went on shore. left the boat on the beach
all night, and the boat got badly stowed.

Remarks Friday Aug 3rd 1866 402
Strong Breezes from N. N. W. at 10 A.M. caught the
mole and took him on board. Employed getting water.

Remarks Saturday Aug 4th 1866 403
Strong winds from E. S. E. with squalls of snow
and rain. Took seven men ashore to ship
them. They signed an agreement to go the
voyage under they say they will not

Strong Gales with squalls of snow. from S. S. E.

Remarks Monday Aug 6th 1866 405
Fresh Breezes and light wet weather. from
S. E. Employed getting wood.

Remarks Tuesday Aug 7th 1866 406
Moderate Breezes from the E. Employed getting wood
had plenty snow last night.

Remarks Wednesday Aug 8th 1866 407
Moderate Breezes from the N. E. getting off
recruits.

Remarks Thursday Aug 9th 1866 408
Fresh Breezes from the North. I went
a shooting. shot 22.

Remarks Friday Aug 10th 1866 409
Fresh Gales from the South. at 6 P.M.
Dropped the 2nd anchor.

Remarks Saturday Aug 11th 1866 410
Strong winds from the South.

Remarks Sunday Aug 12th 1866 411
Moderate Breezes from the Westward all
hands on board all day.

Remarks Monday Aug 13th 1866 412
A Gale of wind from the North.

Remarks Tuesday Aug 14th 1866 413
A Gale from the North. at 4 P.M.
moderate. Put in the draw boat and put
it over head.
