Remarks Monday March 18th 1867. 629th
Begins with light winds from N. to and thick
fog. Latter part - moderate breezes from S.W.
and thick weather course N.N.W. at sail in sight
staring the same. One at

Remarks Tuesday March 19th 630
Begins with moderate breezes from N. to and
foggy squalls. Course N.N.W. Latter part strong
breezes from the S.W. Lat 32-40 Long 15-39

Remarks Wednesday March 20th 631
Begins with pleasant breezes from the S.
course N.N.W. Latter part strong winds from
S.W. at 2 1/2 P.M. shaped the course for the Isle
Santa Maria. Lat 33-41 Long 15-39

Remarks Thursday March 21st March 632
Begins with strong winds from S.W.
at 2 1/2 P.M. shaped the course for Santa Maria.
at 6 1/2 P.M. Dist 22 miles. running under a
double reefed main top sail and fore sail.
At 2 A.M. made Santa Maria, started for
Balcahuano. At 2 P.M. passed into the Bay.
the wind died away. lowered the 8 Boats
and lowered until Sun down. at 11 P.M. came
to Anchor in 15 fathoms water.

Remarks Friday March 22 633 Day
at 9 A.M. took the Anchor and ran up the
Bay, wind from the North at 10 came to Anchor
in 5 fathoms water.

Remarks Wednesday April 23 1867
at 3 P.M. civil time took the Anchor and stood
out to sea for a Cruise for sperm whales.

Remarks Wednesday April 24th 666th
Begins with fresh breezes from the South
at 3 P.M. took the Anchor and went to sea
latter part strong winds from the South
staring to by N. Saw Sulfur & Dolphins.
Lat 33-15 Long 15-41

Remarks Thursday April 25th 667th
Begins with strong southerly winds. Course
to by N. under double reefed top sails.
Latter part strong winds. Lat 33-51

Remarks Friday April 26th 668th
Begins with strong winds from S.E. by S.
staring to by, at 1 1/2 P.M. made Juan Fernandez
at 2 1/2 P.M. supposed to head to the Eastward.
Island Dist 10 miles. Latter part strong winds
at 9 A.M. went in with two boats to catch a mess of
fish.

Remarks Saturday April 27th 669th
Begins with strong winds from S.E. by S. ^{man} ^{lost}
Boats in fishing at Juan Fernandez. at 4 P.M.
returned to the ship. Caught about a barrel.
Latter part fresh gales. Under double reefed main top
sail and fore sail. At 2 1/2 A.M. John Perry a boat
storer that I shipped at Balcahuano fell over board
and was drowned in a fit of the Maraca or Delirium
Tremens. before a boat could get to him. we threw
over a life buoy within a few feet of him. but he
did not notice it. we found that but he was gone.
we had him in the storeroom with a man to watch him.
he ran up on deck and jumped on the rail, threw
his pipe at the Officer of the deck, and slid down
and jumped over board.
