Remarks Friday April 20th 1867. 1371

Moderate Breezes from N to and fine.
at 2 P.M. the S.B. 1st Wallerston let
collar for whales, the Amy was chasing
they went along side of a whale. One of the
Whales came towards us. we lowered and
the W.B. struck at 5 P.M. at 8 took him
along side. W.B. Lat 35-05 Long 82-50

Remarks Wednesday April 17th 1866
Strong winds from E.S.E. Employed Stowing Oil.
at 12 M.W. saw three large whales going quick
to the windward lowered the boats. But they
was going too fast for us. saw them but two risings.

Remarks Thursday April 18th 1866
Moderate Breezes from N.W. at 6 P.M. saw a
large whale. the Amy and Barks Martha
close by. had to make with both of them.
at 2 P.M. the Amy's Boat struck. at 4 P.M.
the Barks Martha Capt. Sartland took him along
side. The three boats are motored until he finishes
boiling.

Remarks Friday April 23rd
light air and calm. at 12 P.M. raised
to school of large whales. lowered. the
W.B. had hooked one and drawn
at 7 P.M. the Boat came on board
Lat 34-03 Long 83-10

Remarks Saturday April 24th 1867
Moderate Breezes and Calm. at 9 A.M.
saw three large whales. the S.B. had
hooked one and drawn. at 3 P.M. lowered
for another. at Sundown struck one to
the W.B. at 7 took him along side.
