Remarks Saturday July 24th 1887. 1887
Begins with light breeze from N.E. heading
by to the N.W. at 2 P.M. tacked to the Eastward
saw two sails. and one hump back.

Latter part light air and baffling E.N.E. to N.E.
tacking about as the wind favors to get to
the North. Saw a number of sails.

Lat 21-21 Long 36-31

Remarks Sunday July 25th 1887
Begins with light air and baffling from
E.N.E. to N.E. trying to get to the North.

Latter part wind N.E. heading by to the N.W.
Saw several ships all heading to the S except one.
One ship showed a red signal with J.E.W. in
it. and an American. Lat 21-13 Long 36-07

Remarks Monday July 26th 1887
Begins with light breeze and baffling
from E to N.E. with squalls. Latter part wind
N.E. trying to get to the Northward.

Lat 20-22 Long 36-07

Remarks Tuesday July 27th 1887
Begins with fresh breeze from the N.E. by E
heading by to the Northward. The wind comes
to be very hard. Employed fitting the royal yards.
Latter part wind N.E. by E. saw one sail.

Lat 18-19 Long 36-34

Remarks Wednesday July 28th 1887
Begins with fresh breeze and baffling from E to
S.E. heading by to the Northward. Saw one sail
heading to the South. Latter part wind E and
E by N squally. heading by to the Northward.

Lat 17-08 Long 36-16

Remarks Thursday July 29th 1887. 1887
Begins with fresh breeze from E to E.S.E.
heading by to the Northward. Beat the main
royal and sent the gaff aloft. The
stevedore is sick. gave up his duty too day
and took to his berth. Latter part moderate
breezes from E by S. sent up the main royal
yard and sail. The first time the ship ever had
one bent. Lat 15-23 Long 35-45

Remarks Friday July 30th 1887.
Begins with moderate breeze from E by S
& E.S.E. heading by to the N.E. Latter part
wind the same. heading N.E. by N. sent up
the bare royal. Lat 13-37 Long 35-06

Remarks Saturday July 31st 1887
Begins with moderate breeze from
from E by S to E.S.E. steering N.E. by N 1/2 N.
My dog is sick. he has had four fits too
day. The will die I think if we do not
knock him in the head. That is the second
one this voyage. I do not think I will try another soon.
Latter part fresh trades from E.S.E. course N.E.
Saw two sails. One an American.

Lat 11-00 Long 34-18

Remarks Sunday Aug 1st 1887
Begins with fresh trades from E.S.E.
course N.E. Latter part moderate breeze from
South. at 9 A.M. made St. Augustine bearing
W N.W. Dist 25 miles. Steered N.W. in place
toward the Land. At noon Lat 8-27 Long 34-32

at 3 P.M. Long 34-39

P.S. We are 52 days from Galapagos.
35 days from the Land the other side
of the Land.
