Remarks Monday Sept 4th 1862. 1526
Begin with baffling land & raw winds
from N.W. to N by E. heading by to the
Westward. all drawing sail set. Saw
two sails steering to the S.E. Middle part
the land, without baffling. Latter part
pleasant breeze from N.E. Course N.W. by N.
Drawing Overboard by war. Lat 33-33 Long 68-37

Remarks Sunday Sept 5th 1862
Begin with pleasant breeze from N.E. and
fine weather. all sail set. heading by the point
N.W. by N.E. at 2 P.M. finished drawing
the 3rd work Overboard and got cleared up.
Latter part moderate breeze from E. saw
one sail steering to the N.W. Price the water
and found it 8 degrees warmer than the air.
Suppose to be in the Gulf.

Lat 37-22 Long 69-35

Remarks Monday Sept 6th 1862
Begin with moderate breeze from Eastward
Course N.W. by N.E. Suppose we are in the
stream. Saw three sails steering to the North.
Hearse One of the Boat started put his
thermometer in one of the Boats to dry. One
of the Other Boat started, a Green Bee, not
knowing what it was. picked it all to
pieces to see what it was. The 3rd sh.
fool. lucky for him that it was not mine.
Middle part pleasant breeze. Latter
part light air from S.E. to S. saw a
number of sails heading to the Southward.

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Lat 38-57 Long 70-33

Ship Alfred Gibbs toward New Bedford

Remarks Tuesday Sept 7th 1862. 1529
Begin with light air from S.E. by S. Course
N.W. at 4 P.M. breeze freshened a little.
Saw a number of sails, all heading to the
Southward. Latter part fresh breeze. Course N.W. by E
from 7 A.M. until noon. At noon hauled up
to N.E. at 1 1/2 P.M. made Sarghead and
Cullighunk. Dist about 10 miles. at 3 took
a Pilot. at 5 1/2 Anchored off the Wharves
in the Port of New Bedford.

So Ends the voyage after an absence of
50 months and twelve days.
