under all sail. 4 sails in sight the Bk
Oray left in sight after making all
sail. The Capt. ordered all hands to be
mustered in the waist and began to question
the crew concerning the bar scrape. He asked
if any of them knew of any one that they
thought was guilty of this act. and Smith
a fore mast hand said that he saw
Charles A. White a wiping bar off his
pants therefore he was supposed to be
one of the party. He was ordered aft
the Capt. asked if there was any one
else that knew any thing more concerning
the affair & John King Lopez said that
he saw White take the said bottle from
Macomber's bunk & Peter Minch a dutch
man (fore mast hand) said that he saw
the same bottle in the same place about
2 weeks ago therefore Minch was supposed
to be one of the party concerned. They
were both put in irons by the Capt.
White denies all that he is accused of
in White's berth there was found a bundle
of clothing tied up all ready to make
his escape should the ship be set on
fire. after questioning Minch he was
found to be not guilty. therefore he was
released & sent on duty. The Capt. is satisfied
that White is the one that made these
preparations for burning the Bk Globe
at sea Saturday July 25th in the lat of
35 28 Longitude 36 29 his things
are all brought aft. This day saw 7 sails

Western Ground Fire Scrape Voo

Tuesday July 27th 1869

This day commenced with a light breeze
from the NNE. steering by the wind
on the Starboard tack under all sail
6 sails in sight. At sundown took in
the light sail & double reefed the top
sails. After taking in sail all hands
was called in the waist & each one
told all they knew about the affair
and all hands are perfectly satisfied
that White is the villain concerned
in the said affair. he is placed in
the main hold chained to the forward
stanchion. he is in an awful condition
as any one should suppose. About part
light breeze from the NNE. heading by
the wind latter part light breeze from
the E. steering by the wind on the Starboard tack
2 sails in sight. Just a driving on the
main stay. To day the Capt. by
perusing White's log book he found
several false remarks concerning the
voyage. one of them is as follows. White
had been in light mast every day and
the Capt. drunk and would not
lower for them. also the Officer was
a scoundrel to attack them. and several
other messes which is false without doubt
as for my self I have not the least
doubt but what he is a contemptible
villain & deserves a severe punishment.
Took the cutting falls out of
fore hold in order to try. White is
in Drom on the quarter deck. The
Capt. has been questioning him about
loging such false messes. he has no excuses
for the same.
