1833

This 24 hours fine weather a light breeze from the S. E. saw one Humpback Whale at the end of these 24 hours Tirceria bears S. W. distant 3 miles

Thursday June 27<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours squally with rain about 3 P.M. saw 5 ships to the leeward squared in and run down to them and spoke the weather one the Capt's being on board of her they proved to be the Emerald George Porter Perrine. Leonidas. Addison. had a royal Sam

Friday June 28<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours fine with a strong breeze from the E. this morning lost Tirceria and steered South for St Michael's and arrived there about 3 P.M. ends this 24 hours

Saturday June 29<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours fine spoke Ship Louisa of Boston about 9 A.M. St Michael's bearing S. distant 10 miles fell in with a ship's top and part of mast lowered a boat and took it alongside found several names cut on it with a knife So ends this 24 hours

Sunday June 30<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours fine with a light breeze from the South spoke Ship Addison of Fairhaven with 50 B of Sperm Oil

Monday July 1<sup>st</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours fine found the head of our main topmast rotten sent it down and fitted another St Michael's bearing W. distant 10 miles

Tuesday July 2<sup>nd</sup>  
1833

This day fine weather all hands employed in rigging the ship spoke Ship Delta of Greenport no oil

Wednesday July 3<sup>rd</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours fine stood in for the Land and went on shore at Delegada and got some recruits and spoke for some more

Thursday July 4<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours fair with a strong breeze from the West spoke Ship Delta and gamed with her all day at 4 P.M. broke our Futtuck Band around the main

Friday July 5<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours squally spoke Brig Ospray of New London five weeks out no oil Tint Delegada bearing W distant 10 miles

Saturday July 6<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours calm spoke Ship Beaver of Hudson no oil bound around Cape Horn So ends these 24 hours

Sunday July 7<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours fine about 6 A.M. landed at Delegada and got our recruits in company with Ship Delta and Frances of New Bedford

Monday July 8<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours fine got under weigh and stood to the South about 3 P.M. raised blackfish lowered but got none

Tuesday July 9<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours fine with a strong breeze from the East about 10 A.M. raised blackfish lowered the boats but got none Course South  
Lat 35° 21'  
Long 25° 00'

Wednesday July 10<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours strong breeze and squally saw nothing So ends this 24 hours  
Lat 32° 10'

Thursday July 11<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours fine with strong shades about 5 P.M. passed a Bangor Ship standing to the west
