

Saturday Aug<sup>t</sup> 24<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours fine saw a  
Ship to the windward and  
several Finback Whales  
So Ends this 24 hours

Sunday Aug<sup>t</sup> 25<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours dull Smoky weather  
with a strong breeze from N.W. W.  
At 6 P.M. hove the ship under storm  
sails  
Lat<sup>t</sup> 37° 00'  
Long 15° 30'

Monday Aug<sup>t</sup> 26<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours thick weather with a  
strong breeze from the N.W. saw  
finbacks  
Lat<sup>t</sup> 36° 45'  
Long 13 40

Tuesday Aug<sup>t</sup> 27<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours a Gale from N.W. W.  
Ship hove to under storm sails  
Lat<sup>t</sup> 37° 30'  
Long 12° 30'

Wednesday Aug<sup>t</sup> 28<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours a continued Gale but  
more severe at 4 P.M. lighted up  
and we saw the Island of  
Cristan De Luna bearing S. W.  
30 miles Distant

Thursday Aug<sup>t</sup> 29<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours a severe Gale main  
top sail furled and all hands below  
No Lat<sup>t</sup> this Day

Friday Aug<sup>t</sup> 30  
1833

First part of this 24 hours moderated  
set a closer reefed main top sail  
at 12 O'clock set the fore sail  
Lat<sup>t</sup> 36° 6'  
Long 9° 00'

Saturday Aug<sup>t</sup> 31<sup>th</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours squally with a strong  
breeze from the N.W. at 6 A.M.  
spoke Ship Connecticut of New London

Sunday <sup>Sept</sup> 1<sup>st</sup>  
1833

This 24 hours squally with rain and  
hail under close reefed Topsails and  
fore sail the Island bearing South  
West distant 50 miles

Monday Sept 2<sup>d</sup>  
1833

The first part of these 24 hours calm  
at 9 A.M. raised 3 Blackfish lowered  
the Boats and got 2 latter part  
strong winds ran in to the land  
and doubled reefed the top sails

Tuesday Sept 3<sup>d</sup>  
1833

All these 24 hours squally at 4 A.M.  
raised 2 Whales bound in towards  
the land saw 12 Ships these 24 hours

Wednesday Sept 4<sup>th</sup>  
1833

These 24 hours squally all sail furled  
the Island bearing N.W. 20 miles off

Thursday Sept 5<sup>th</sup>  
1833

All these 24 hours a severe gale from  
the N.W. Ship hove to under  
mizen Staysail latter part more moderate

Friday Sept 6<sup>th</sup>  
1833

All these 24 hours fine almost calm  
at 2 P.M. I raised Whales lowered  
the boats and pulled till sunset  
got nothing Island bearing N.W. W.  
distant 30 miles off

Saturday Sept 7<sup>th</sup>  
1833

All these 24 hours light  
breezes from the N.W. and  
thick weather  
So Ends these 24 hours
