Whale lowered and got clothing
Lat^t 32° 30' E

Tuesday Oct 22
1833

This 24 hours strong wind from
the S. W. lowered and the Mate
took a Whale to the Ship and
cut her in spoke ship, Tuscarora
of W. London 1100^{lb} of Oil
Lat^t 34° 00'
Long 12° 30'

Wednesday Oct 23th
1833

This 24 hours rugged took a large
whale to my Boat spoke ship
London Packet 550^{lb}

Thursday Oct 24th
1833

This 24 hours fine got nothing
all hands employed in boiling
Lat^t 33° 50'

Friday Oct 25th
1833

This 24 hours rugged all hands
employed in boiling and stowing
down saw Whales to rugged
to lower

Saturday Oct 26th
1833

This 24 hours very rugged finished
boiling saw no whals
Lat^t 33° 00'
Long 13° 00'

Sunday Oct 27th
1833

This 24 hours more moderate
finished stowing down saw no
Whals
Lat^t 33° 3'
Long 12° 30'

Monday Oct 28th
1833

This 24 hours fine got a whale to the
Coff Boat Mate got fast Coff cut in
Line spoke ship South Boston Whales

Tuesday Oct 29th
1833

This 24 hours equally rugged weather
all hands employed in boiling

Wednesday Oct 30
1833

This 24 hours rugged finished
boiling and stowing down carried
sail through the night to get to
the westward

Thursday Oct 31st
1833

This 24 hours rugged saw a
Merchant Ship standing to the
N. W. showed a Yankee flag
Saw 2 Whales

Friday Nov 1st
1833

This 24 hours moderate got a Whale
to the Starboard boat

Saturday Nov 2nd
1833

This 24 hours fine got nothing
all hands employed
Lat^t 32° 48'
Long 11° 00' E

Sunday Nov 3rd
1833

This 24 hours fine weather saw a
great many Whales and chased
all day but got now 2 ships in
sight whals very wild etc. man crop

Monday Nov 4th
1833

This 24 hours a gale from the
S. W. finished boiling

Tuesday Nov 5th
1833

This 24 hours fine saw Whales
lowered and got fast the Whale
going quick to the windward
Iron drawn Lat^t 33° 00'
Long 11° 00'
