Saturday Nov 23th
1833

This 24 hours fine saw a Ship
Cutting saw no Whales Course N. N. W.
Long 8° 00

Sunday Nov 24th
1833

This 24 hours fine Weather saw no
Whales Spoke Barque Champs of
St Andrews 1000th of Oil also
one English & French Barque

Monday Nov 25th
1833

This 24 hours strong Breezes Spoke
Ships: Fendron, Albion & Heroine
Also the Milwood with 10 whales
Saw one whale chased without success

Tuesday Nov 26th
1833

This 24 hours fine weather got a
Whale to the Bow Boat saw
the Milwood to a Whale also
Lat 32° 30
Long 5° 00 W

Wednesday Nov 27th
1833

This 24 hours good Weather
saw no Whales Course South
employed in Biding
Lat 33° 20 W

Thursday Nov 28th
1833

This 24 hours strong Breezes saw
no Whales employed in stowing
down Milwood in company

Friday Nov 29th
1833

This 24 hours rugged Weather saw
the George Porter to Lward
So ends this day

Saturday Nov 30
1833

First part of these 24 hours strong
Breezes latter part a Gale from the
North saw Whales
Lat 35° 30
Long 5° 30 E

Sunday Dec 1st
1833

This 24 hours rugged thick Weather
saw Whales but could not get any on
account of the weather
Lat 35° 00

Monday Dec 2nd
1833

This 24 hours fine Weather saw a
great many Whales lowered the Boat
and took 3 large Whales to the Ship
one to the Starboard in the other to
the Bow Boat Spoke Ship Shiloh
of Rochester 6 months out 6 Whales
Lat 35° 20
Long 5° 10

Tuesday Dec 3rd
1833

This 24 hours good weather plenty of
whales lowered and took a whale
to the Starboard Boat one to the
will last the longer

Wednesday Dec 4th
1833

This 24 hours thick weather all hands
employed in Biding and stowing down
saw Whales. So End this day

Thursday Dec 5th
1833

This 24 hours very rugged saw Whales
Spoke Ship Shiloh of N. Bedford
with 1100th of Oil

Friday Dec 6th
1833

All of these 24 hours fine at 6 o'clock
lowered the Boat and took an 100th
whale to the Starboard Boat Spoke
the Barque White Oak and China of
N. Bedford with 700th of Oil
