These 24 hours strong winds
saw nothing carrying all sail hating
to windward wind West

These 24 hours strong winds at
4 P. M. reefed the Topsails
Saw nothing Lat 40° 10
Long 2° 00

First part of these 24 hours strong
breezes at 12 O'clock Spike Ship
Herald of Fair Haven 1200 lbs
of Oil latter part fine weather
Lat 41° 00
Long 3° 00

First part of these 24 hours calm
latter part light breezes saw
the Herald take a whale to
the leeward saw one whale
and chased without success

First part of these 24 hours light
breezes from the North latter
part a gale bore the ship too
under Staysail Lat 43° 00

These 24 hours a Gale from the
North West saw a Barque to the
leeward supposed to be the Chicago
Rait of St. Francis

These 24 hours ship under Staysails
heading S. S. W. Saw nothing

These 24 hours more moderate
set doubled reefed Topsails
and courses altered to the North
saw nothing

These 24 hours almost calm since
11 A. M. & all drawing sail set
standing to the westward
Lat 42° 25

These 24 hours strong breezes
from the N. W. saw whales
lowered the boats and took one
to the waist boat Lat 42° 30
Long 6° 30
