

Remarks On Board Ship Thursday July 1st day 1841

this 24 hours with strong winds from the S. saw a whail bark squally thru the night at day light 2 brigs in sight and fine weather at 8 made all sail steering S. E. the island of Flores 10 miles of later part moderate so ends

Lat 39.10 North Long 31.35 W

Friday July 2nd day 1841

this 24 hours begins with fine weather from the West steering S. East for Lysall middle and later part moderate so ends this 24 hours

Lat 38.50 N Long 30.00 West

Saturday July 3rd day 1841

this 24 hours begins with light winds from the West at 4 P.M. saw 4 boats for blackfish and got nothing middle part calm later part light wind from the E. East so ends this 24 hours

Lat 38.29 N Long 28.29 W

Sunday July 4th day 1841

this 24 hours begins with light winds from the S. E. Ship heading E. S. E. saw blackfish middle part wind E. S. E. heading S. E. middle part fine later calm & pleasant watch in place in Ships duty so ends this 24 hours

Lat 37.54 N Long 26.54 W

Monday July 5th day 1841

this 24 hours begins with light winds from the E. S. E. Ship heading S. East with all sail out at sunset shortened sail later part much the same made all sail at daylight so ends

Lat 28.22 N Long 26.54 W

Gratitude In the Atlantic Ocean Tuesday June 6th day 1841

this 24 hours begins with fine breeze from the S. E. heading S. E. by the wind with all sail out at sunset took ship to the West at 12 P.M. took to the East at day light the island of pick and Lysall in sight so ends this 24 hours

Lat 28.30 N Long 25.40 W

Wednesday July 7th day 1841

this 24 hours begins with fine winds and weather from the S. East took ship several times to visit by all and pick at sunset saw several ships lying off and on at by all shortened sail stood off thru the night and went in in the morning the Captain and boats crew went on shore so ends this 24 hours

Lat 37.54 N Long 26.54 W

Thursday July 8th day 1841

this 24 hours fine wind and weather lying off and on at Lysall the Ship Sharon of Swinhaven is being lying off and on we took on board 100 bushels of potatoes and 40 bushels onions and steered to the South moderate thru the night later part much the same so ends this 24 hours

Lat 37.27 N Long 26.54 W

Friday July 9th day 1841

this 24 hours with strong winds from S. E. steering S. E. at 1 P.M. saw a whail boat, saw 4 boats the worst boat struck the whail over him 2 hours and he cut the starboard boat struck and drew the larboard boat got a whail made 35 blks at 5 took him a long side and took in all sail and laid by thru the night at day light Commences cutting at 11 P.M. and began boiling so ends this 24 hours
