

# Remarks On Board Ship

Monday June 6<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with strong winds and over east weather from the south steering East at 4 P.M. in sail and took the boats on the upper coasts at sunset kept to the S.E. at daylight set four sail at 8 A.M. took it in blowing heavy from the S.W. and heavy squalls of rain ship heading E.S.E. so ends this 24 hours

in Lat <sup>1</sup> 40° 30' Long <sup>1</sup> 170° 00' E

Tuesday June 7<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with heavy gales from the S.W. later more pleasant made sun sail and mended mizen top sail ends pleasant saved the Parker

Wednesday June 8<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with fine weather from the S.W. steering to the S.E. at sunset in sail at daylight made sail at 11 A.M. saw a school of sperm whales heard 4 boats but got nothing the whale saw the ship went to the mizen

Thursday June 9<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with fine wind and smoky air at 4 P.M. saw whales to the windward to far of to lose at daylight made sail ends

Friday June 10<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with light winds and pleasant weather having a boat at sunset in sail in place fishing on cum at daylight made sail and steered S.E. so ends this 24 hours

Saturday June 11<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours zigzag in a boat saw spinback fine weather

Sunday June 12<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with fine weather at sunset in sail saw a ship of the ice here and fine and pleasant

# Gratitude On Saffron Pacific

Monday June 13<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with fine wind and pleasant weather at sunset 2 ships in sight to the S.E. at sunset in sail later saw finbacks so ends

in Lat <sup>1</sup> 40° 30' Long <sup>1</sup> 170° 00' E

Tuesday June 14<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with light wind and pleasant weather at sunset in sail at daylight made sail saw finbacks ends fine and pleasant

in Lat <sup>1</sup> 40° 30' Long <sup>1</sup> 170° 00' E

Wednesday June 15<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with light winds and pleasant weather from the S.W. at sunset in sail to the S.E. at daylight made sail and steered S.E.

Thursday June 16<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with light wind and pl weather at sunset in sail at daylight made sail to the N.E. so ends

Friday June 17<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with fine wind and pleasant weather at 2 P.M. saw sperm whales heard 4 boats the bow boat struck and killed at the larboard of boat struck and lost his line at 4 the bow boat took her whale to the ship at daylight commenced cutting at 12 finished and commenced hauling in

in Lat <sup>1</sup> 40° 30' Long <sup>1</sup> 170° 00' E

Saturday June 18<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with pleasant weather in place hauling at 2 P.M. saw sperm whales heard larboard and waist boat the larboard boat struck and killed at 4 P.M. took her to the ship at daylight commenced cutting at 12 finished in place hauling

in Lat <sup>1</sup> 40° 30' Long <sup>1</sup> 170° 00' E

Sunday June 19<sup>th</sup> day 1842

this 24 hours begins with fine weather at 1 P.M. saw sperm whales heard larboard and bow boat the larboard boat struck the bow boat fastened and filled her at 8 P.M. took her to the ship at daylight commenced cutting at 12 finished in place hauling in
