

114 Remarks on Wednesday September 10th 1851

These 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from ENE & cloudy weather  
at 6 P.M. unusual sail steering over for treceira at 2 P.M. kept off south to ship  
at 6 A.M. to the westward of treceira bound over to St. George's watch employed in  
ships duty various kinds of work about the rigging etc. own down treceira  
at 8 A.M. bore by compass ENE distant 15 miles shortened sail & steered NNE  
at 10 A.M. made all necessary sail at St. Michael's bearing ENE & watch  
employed in ships duty making a tarpaulin for the spars & other various  
kinds of work on board the day ended with a fresh breeze  
Left in by log 37.12 or long in by chronometer 26.00 West

115 Remarks on Thursday September 11th 1851

These 24 hours begins with a fresh breeze from ENE & some piping  
at 6 P.M. squalls steering south watch employed in ships duty at 2 P.M. saw  
at 6 A.M. a strong sail at our own down last reefed the topsails & steered by the  
wind to the SE middle & latter part of the day fresh breeze from E  
at 8 A.M. to ENE & passing down steering by the wind to the south under all used  
at 10 A.M. sail watch employed in ships duty the day ended more moderate  
Left in by log 35.58 or long in by chronometer 25.11 West

116 Remarks on Friday September 12th 1851

These 24 hours begins with fresh breeze from ENE & piping clouds  
at 6 P.M. steering to the south by the wind under double reef topsails watch employed  
at 6 A.M. in ships duty put on the main masts on the main shrouds & hove down  
some of the Mizzen rising back stays & the main shrouds at sun down  
shortened sail middle & latter part of the day moderate breeze from  
at 8 A.M. ENE to SE at 5 A.M. made sail & hove out the larboard side  
at 10 A.M. of the main hatchway & took up our heads & flour & wafers etc  
at 12 A.M. & steered it back a gear at 10 saw a strong whaling barge off  
our lee bow steering by the wind to the SE at midday on was to the  
ship to the SE & set all sail so ended this day light winds & fine weather  
Left in by log 34.38 or long in by chronometer 24.50 West

117 Remarks on Saturday September 13th 1851

These 24 hours begins with light winds from ENE & fine weather steering  
at 6 P.M. by the wind to the SE one league off our lee bow steering the same watch  
at 6 A.M. employed in cooking bread & flour & steering off at 1 past 3 P.M. finished  
the main hatchway & hove out the larboard side of fore hatchway at 5  
finished steering off the fore hatchway at 4 before 6 P.M. saw a school of  
small sperm whales off our lee quarter coming to the windward  
3 miles from us were lowerer for them 20 minutes after sun down  
struck two to the larboard & waisted boats at 8 got them fluked  
a long side & shortened sail middle & latter part of the day light winds  
at 8 A.M. & fine weather at 6 A.M. called all hands & got up one cutting tackle &  
at 10 A.M. hoisted the small one in hole & took the big one in in two pieces by the  
head & shoulders at 6 A.M. came on board from the barge Millerwood  
after letters 11 months out 100 lbs. loaded at 1 past 7 we got our whales  
on deck made sail & steered to the ENE by the wind & the Millerwood to the  
N in the day ended fine weather nothing in sight  
Left in by log 34.54 or long in by chronometer 24.42 West

118 Remarks on Sunday September 14th 1851

These 24 hours begins with light winds from the SE & fine weather steering  
at 6 P.M. by the wind to the ENE watch employed in haming & mincing our blubber  
at 6 A.M. at 2 P.M. the wind hauled round to the westward steered SE at sun down  
shortened sail at 8 A.M. at 10 the wind hauled from the steered to the SE by  
at 10 A.M. the wind middle & latter part of the day fine breeze & fine weather at 1 past  
at 10 A.M. made all sail saw several sails in sight whalers at midday took up  
Left in by log 34.21 or long in by chronometer 24.25 West

119 Remarks on Monday September 15th 1851

These 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from SE & fine weather steering  
at 6 P.M. to the SE by the wind a plenty of whaling vessels in sight at sun down  
at 6 A.M. shortened sail & were ship to the SE middle & latter part of the day moderate  
breeze from the westward & fine weather at 8 A.M. made sail & made a  
fire & commenced boiling out our whale at 10 A.M. the barge Millerwood  
at 10 A.M. greenport spoke us 68 days out then several other vessels in sight the day  
ended the same boiling  
Left in by log 34.12 or long in by chronometer 23.50 West
