105 Remarks on Wednesday January 28th 1852

There 24 hours began with fresh breeze from north & fair weather &
at 6 P.M. rough sea & the winter heading East watch employed in ships duty
breeze at 2 P.M. various kinds of work saw one sail off our lee beam steering to the east
supposed to be the Elizabeth at 3 P.M. were further the main sail at sun
down shortened sail middle & latter part of the day strong breeze from the north
& rough sea on & cloudy weather at 1 A.M. were ship to the east in old
part 5 A.M. saw some kind of whale bearing N.W. from our fore topsail
at 5 A.M. double reefed & then tacked & steamed N.W. the large Elizabeth in sight
breeze at 2 P.M. the wind off for us at 2 P.M. to the north & part 9 were ship to the East
saw nothing more of the whale watch employed in ships duty making a tub
over & black stove & other various kinds of work on board the day was with
strong winds & a rough sea on Elizabeth of our weather, beam steering to the east
Left in 4 deg 35.15 South Long in 4 account 119.10 west

106 Remarks on Thursday January 29th 1852

There 24 hours began with strong breeze from north & cloudy weather & rough
at 5 P.M. & bearing on & tacking up heading to the North upon two double reef
breeze at 2 P.M. topsails Elizabeth to the windward heading the same watch employed in
ships duty making a tub over & shaping two studding sails black blocks
& put two reef tacks blocks in the fore sail & making a foot mat for the
ship at 8 P.M. reefed fore sail & reefed main topsail & put fore topsail
raining & thick weather at 5 P.M. the winter hallooed round to the ship at 2 P.M.
began to breeze on in squalls at 4 tacked in the fore sail & put fore
breeze at 2 P.M. latter part of the day fresh gales from North & heavy squalls lying under
last reef main topsail main spruce & fore topsail & fore sail the large
Elizabeth & brace of us lying two the day was with fresh gales
Left in 4 deg 34.11 South Long in 4 chronometer 119.00 west

107 Remarks on Friday January 30th 1852

There 24 hours began with fresh gales from North & heavy squalls & rough sea
at 5 P.M. on lying under short sail heading to the North the Elizabeth in sight lying
breeze at 2 P.M. the same was put on & when spoke to our vessel at 4 were ship to the North & winter
manoeuvring some latter part of the day strong breeze & heavy weather at 5 A.M.
set double reef topsails & fore sail & steamed by the winter heading 2 P.M. to East
the Elizabeth & one more sailing barque in sight at 7 A.M. were saw whale
3 points off our weather, bore & going N.W. were made all sail at 2 tacked ship
at 5 A.M. to the North saw the whale 3 miles off & came on equally & heavy heavy squalls
breeze at 2 P.M. till in all sail for them last sight of the whale the day was thick squally weather
Left in 4 account 34.30 South Long in 4 account 119.50 west

108 Remarks on Saturday January 31th 1852

There 24 hours began with strong breeze from North & thick weather &
at 5 P.M. heading off heading to the westward at 1 P.M. set double reef topsails & then
breeze at 2 P.M. watch employed in making three close barque Elizabeth off our lee beam steering
by the winter to the westward at 11 P.M. saw the Elizabeth speak at strong barque to
the leeward of her at 2 past 5 P.M. tacked ship to the eastward at sun down shortened
sail middle & latter part of the day light winds & calms & pleasant weather at 2 P.M.
at 5 A.M. were ship to the North & made sail two barques in sight to the leeward at 7 we went
breeze at 2 P.M. out eight starn watch employed in ships duty at 9 calm the day was the same
Left in 4 deg 34.22 South Long in 4 chronometer 119.10 west

109 Remarks on Sunday February 1st 1852

There 24 hours began with calms & pleasant weather watch employed in ships duty
at 5 P.M. one strong barque in sight to the north of us at sun down took in sail at 9 P.M.
breeze at 2 P.M. A light breeze sprang up from the North & then South latter part of the day
moderate breeze from north to north at 5 A.M. made sail one barque in
sight at 7 then by the winter heading from North to North at 11 passed a
whale carcass saw porpoise & birds at 11 the barque went out of sight to the East
at 5 A.M. at midday steamed N.W. & saw another carcass bearing N.W.
breeze at 2 P.M. Left in 4 deg 34.30 South Long in 4 chronometer 50.00 west
