Then 2d Hour begins with light breeze from the NNE & fine weather stinging
at 6 P.M. his 1st watch employed in ship's duty looking flying jib & washing & varnishing
barnet 30% the cabin & wheel in sight at sun down we were 5 miles from
Laguna town inside & latter part of the day light breeze from NNE to South
at 5 A.M. made sail 6 wheel in sight watch employed in ship's duty
at 6 A.M. washing out the cabin & setting up the bowsprit & rigging stinging to the
barnet 30% E.B. by the wind down the boat & went to a drift plank the day new
with a fine breeze from NNE & fine weather.

340 Remarks on Thursday July 1st 1852

Here 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from NBE & fine weather at 6 P.M. stowing to the Eastward by the wine watch employed in ships duty burnt 30 lbs about the rigging & varnishing the cabin at sun down stowed six muids of flour on by compass Westward heading NE by the wine watch & latter part of the day fine breeze from the at 6 A.M. a fine weather at 6 A.M. made all sail & steered NE at 9 saw burnt 29 3/4 saw fagot & Pico employed in washing out the boiler & Porting saw horse pine & pinlocks at 10 steered NE BE the day ends with a fine breeze & fine weather. Lat in 40° 30' 50" North

341. Remarks on Friday July 2^d 1852

There 24 Hours being with a fine breeze from NW & fine
 At 8 P.M. weather clearing from SE BE the East Royal Pico St George
 Mount 2957th Graciosa in light water employed in washing out the boats
 & painting & varnishing them saw porpoise & finbacks & one
 for the port Schooner steering to the NW by the wind at 10 P.M.
 finished washing & varnishing the Cabin at 8 Sun down saw two
 sail & wore ship to the NW by the middle & Letter part of the day
 fresh breeze from the SW & smoky weather at 6 A.M. made sail
 at 8 A.M. & then E SE for Graciosa watch employed in washing three
 barrels 2957th where saw a plenty of finbacks went down at long the
 East of Graciosa saw one barque steering to the NW by
 the day was fine weather clearing for Graciosa

342 Remarks on Saturday July 3^d 1852

There 211 hours begins with a fine breeze from NW & some
at 6 P.M. Smokey standing over for Pereira saw one barque steering
about 29³⁰ up for Graciosa with empty, in working there due at 4
past 5 P.M. the whole Fleet bore 28 1/2 miles distant & 3 or 4 sailing
barques in sight at sun down Motioned sail & then S.E. for St
Michael's Mole & latter Part of the day strong breeze from NW & thick
weather at 8 A.M. let 2000 & 1000 saw several frigates at 4 past
at 6 A.M. 9 A.M. saw the West End of St. Michael's bearing 29 NW by compass
about 29 30 at 8 past 11 A.M. wore ship to the NW & went in to the St. Michael's bay
the day in strong breeze & thick weather

343 Remarks on Sunday July 4th 1852

Here Mr. Kears begins with strong breeze from N.W. to N.E. & thick
 weather & rough sea during by the winter to the N.W. monsoon. Sailed here
 about 29³⁰ at 1 P.M. took in four topsails at 2 the winter hauled to the N.W. mon-
 soon & made water but the fore topsail at 4 then 18 down in to the mouth
 of the bay at 5 down down by the winter to the N.E. & the part of the
 day fresh breeze from the N.W. & passing down at 5 A.M. made sail
 about 29³⁰ & steered in to the westward for the East End of St. Michaels at 9 then
 off 18 for the East End of the Glacier the day ended with a fresh breeze

344 Remarks on Mining July 5th 1852

There 24 hours begins with fresh breeze from N.W. & passing across straits
at 6 P.M. to the S.E. down for the East End of St. Michaels Island at 2 P.M. passed
the East End & steamed S.W. saw one fish boat off at 4 P.M. & at 6 P.M. down
St. Marys Island bore S.W. & St. Michaels bore N.W. the tide rose & turned by the
wind to the S.E. at 1 P.M. we took a small signal from the East End
the part of the day fine breeze from S.W. & fine weather & a heavy swell on
at 6 A.M. the land & moon set watch employed in ships duty were employed
in stacking off empty provision barrels the day ended with light winds
left in 404 37.15 at Long in 4.00 on the 24.00 next
