There 24 hours begins with light winds from SE & helling to the south
 at 6 P.M.
 B.R. 30th / 40
 A smooth sea & pleasant weather steering by the wind to the N.W. over
 for 24 miles & a plenty of grampopes in sight at 2 P.M. latched
 ship to the Eastward towards Graciosa at 4 p.m. I landed on board & went
 on board of the large Port of New London 5 months out 12 or 14
 A sun down in the land soil at 8 I came on board mine & set to port
 of the day moderate breeze from SE & fine weather at 5 A.M. made sail
 & commenced heaving out the Labrador side of the after hole to stow
 at 6 A.M.

 down we saw several whaling vessels & a plenty of grampopes
 the weather fine with heading towards the N.W. by the wind

Then 24 Hours begins with light wind from N & fine weather
at 6 P.M all hands Employ'd in stowing down oil in the after hold some
B.R. 30¹/₄ wheel in sight at 3 P.M. hatched ship to the ENE off port fog at
at sun down double reefed the topsails took in Jib & Main
& left off work & set the watch at 1 A.M. were ship Latter part of the day
at 6 A.M calm weather & smooth sea all hands Employ'd in stowing down oil 3
B.R. 29³/₄ mile in sight the day even calm & pleasant weather

395. Remarks on Wednesday August 25th 1852

There 200 tons begins with calm weather & a smooth sea & pleasant
at 6 P.M. with all hands employ'd in stowing down six 3 whales in sight at
B.R. 29³/₄ 7 P.M. got all the oil down & finished stowing of the bale we were so busy
over to payal at 1 A.M. A light breeze sprung up from the N.E. & latter part
at 6 A.M. of the day light wind all round the compass & calm & thick weather & raining
B.R. 29³/₄ 4 spells watch employ'd in stowing of the fore bale & washing off the ship
inside the day now thick weather

396 Remarks on Tuesday August 26th 1852

These 24 hours begins with light winds & variable & thick weather &
 at 6 P.M. raining by spells water empty, in working of the ship inside at 2 P.M. finished
 B.R. 24^{3/4} working saw the fore & part of New London to the land, of us at 8 P.M.
 we took ship to the N.E. side & latter part of the day light winds from N.E.
 at 6 P.M. fine weather at 8 P.M. made all sail stowing east, the wind water empty, in this day
 B.R. 25^{3/4} moved up the river work & ground up the flues & other various kinds of work saw several
 boats & yachts the day ends fine weather

397 Remarks on Friday August 27th 1852

These 24 hours begins with light winers from NE & fine weather steering by the
 at 6 P.M. winer to the Eastward towards grain or a watch empty in this day fitting
 at 29³²₁₀ up whaling gear & other various things of work on board at 6 P.M. saw two
 large spots & points off our weather bow & miles off they looked like sperm
 whale spots & we saw a large quantity of grasshopper nearly calm at
 Sun down shot our fair & warm ship to the Eastward at 7 o'clock at 3 P.M. the winer
 hauled up from the NE & made all sail & steered to the Eastward by the
 at 6 P.M. wind at 6 saw a large whale off our bow beam going N.W. at 10
 at 29³²₁₀ found 3 boats for him several birds in sight the winer dived away calm
 & the whale going quickly turned off to the Eastward could not come up
 with him the day was calm off after a whale

398 Remarks on Saturday August 20th 1852

Then 24 hours lying with light airs & calm weather 3 boats off chasing
 at 6 P.M. A whale going quickly to about East several sails in sight at 2 past
 B.R. 29th 1 P.M. come on board without success at 5 calm at sun were unable
 to find the topsails Middle & Letter parts of the day light airs & wind & calms
 at 6 A.M. & pleasant weather at 5 P.M. made sail 2 sails in sight watch employed
 B.R. 29th in making then close saw some grampuses then over moderate calm

399 Remarks on Sunday August 29th 1852

Their 24 Hours begins with light airs of wind from the NE & calm &
 pleasant weather watch employ'd in washing there then one portugus
 schooner in sight at sun down double reef'd the topsail calm weather
 at day light the wind hauled from NE at 8 Made sail & steer N E
 for grainsea one Merchant ship in sight we had a few hours of rain
 at 9 Steer NW by at Messieurs Steer on by once the day being calm

400 Remarks on Money August 30th 1832

There 24 hours before with light air of wind & calm & pleasant weather
 at 6 P.M. 5 Blanes in sight from west going Rio Sagat & Pirairera at sun down
 BR 24th 1/2 Shoten sail made & latter part of the day light wind from the S.E.
 & fine weather at 5 A.M. made all sail saw grasshoppers & 3 sails water
 at 6 A.M. Employed in stowing up the foreboard for & Main Shroues & turning
 BR 30th & some of the after Main Shroues the day mild fine weather.
