There 24 Hours begins with light winds from the E & E & fine
at 6 P.M. weather clearing & the wind to the E & E bearing in for the Green tree
BR 29³⁰ sails in sight to the windward one of them humpbacked to bring inside &
latter part of the day fresh breeze by shifts & some peeping squalls touching
off on at St. Cruz at 2 o'clock bound the boat & pulled in to St. Cruz
to bring the ruff to land came on board & staid for Logans &
at 6 A.M. went on shore would not get off with it being too rough the barque
BR 29³⁰ Joseph Butler capt Mayhem of New Bedford laying off & on recruiting
& waiting to get off with it so once this day laying off & on at Logans

1122 Remarks on Tuesday September 21st 1852

There 24 Hours begins with fresh breeze from E & E & E & peeping
at 5 P.M. squalls laying off & on at Logans town in company with the barque
BR 29³⁰ Joseph Butler at 4 P.M. came on board & staid by the wind to the E
at 2 past 9 tockid ship to the E & E in towards the land inside &
latter part of the day fresh breeze from E & E to E & E & some peeping
squalls of rain & wind at 4 past 7 A.M. sent the boat to the
Logans & Long off Emanuel & we got our catch ready & went
at 6 A.M. on shore with 66 bbls of catch & two boats to fill with water &
BR 29³⁰ the Joseph butlers boat went on shore at the same time with catch
the day now laying off & on at Logans watering place

1123 Remarks on Monday September 22nd 1852

There 24 Hours begins with fresh breeze from about E & E & some
at 5 P.M. peeping squalls laying off & on at Flores in company with the
BR 29³⁰ barque Joseph Butler getting water at 4 P.M. we got the raft
A long oar & boards it in & I went on shore & got some fresh
meat & Eggs at our own came on board & steered by the wind
to the bar to at 5 A.M. the wind hauled the at 6 o'clock calm at 7 the wind
blew from the E & E to the Eastward by the wind watch Employed in
BR 29³⁰ pumping fresh water & stowing in the fore hold Flores island being made
at 11 A.M. I thought sail the day now fair weather
left in 7 ay 30th to Logans by chosen met 30.50 miles

1124 Remarks on Thursday September 23rd 1852

There 24 Hours begins with fresh breeze from about South & very good sailing
at 6 P.M. by the wind to the E & E watch Employed in stowing down water & stowing off
BR 29³⁰ the hatchways one strong sail in sight at 4 past 3 finished stowing down
water & catch at 7 P.M. water keels inside & latter part of the day strong breeze from
South & ruff sea & thick weather by shifts at 8 A.M. turned the ruff out at 8 tockid
ship to the E & E at 4 past 7 tockid the topsails one sail in sight at 9 tockid
at 6 A.M. ship to the E & E one barque off our weather, quartered stowing the same as we
BR 29³⁰ on the day now strong breeze & thick weather no observation

1125 Remarks on Friday September 24th 1852

There 24 Hours begins with strong breeze from South to E & E very good sea
at 6 P.M. & thick weather stowing by the wind to the Eastward on barque off our weather
BR 29³⁰ quartered stowing the same at 3 P.M. saw one more barque off our weather
at 3 P.M. tockid ship to the E & E at 2 A.M. tockid ship to the Eastward latter part
of the day fresh breeze from South & thick weather by shifts watch Employed in washing
at 6 A.M. then clear at 11 A.M. the George the day now moderate winds & ruff sea
BR 29³⁰ tockid ship to the E & E latter part of the day 3 P.M. tockid

1126 Remarks on Saturday September 25th 1852

There 24 Hours begins with moderate breeze from South & clear weather stowing
at 6 P.M. to the bar by the wind watch Employed in washing then clear the George &
BR 29³⁰ graciosa entered in sight bearing NE at 1 P.M. saw ship to the E & E &
made all sail stowing by the wind at sun down staid on sail & went ship to the
N.M. & staid 3 watches at 1 A.M. the wind hauled to the westward at 3 A.M.
at 6 A.M. wind ship & staid in for graciosa light winds & fine weather watch Employed
BR 29³⁰ in firing for top sail yard broke out the main hatchway after setting stuff
2 sails in sight the day now light breeze

1127 Remarks on Sunday September 26th 1852

There 24 Hours begins with light winds from the westward & fine weather stowing
at 6 P.M. 1 A.M. for graciosa watch Employed in ships duty cleaning the ship &
BR 29³⁰ the various kinds of work at sun down staid on sail & staid by the wind to the
Eastward latter part of the day fine breeze from East to E at 6 A.M. made sail
at 6 A.M. & staid in for the land at 10 A.M. by the wind to the E & E some peeping squalls
BR 29³⁰ of rain at Miriguas tockid ship to the South
