Sunday August 22: 1897
This day begins with Clear and Pleasant weather from the S. S. E. heading by the wind W. S. W. at day light went up tackles and brock out to the oil down and all hands employed stowing down at 6 P. M. hooked up tackles and washed of decks, two 2 sails in sight so ends this day

Monday August 23: 1897
This day begins with Clear and Pleasant weather from the South heading by the wind S. E. at day light made sail and began to work in the oil at 3.00 P. M. finished stowing the oil and washed of decks so ends this day with 3 sails in sight and one steamer.

Tuesday August 24: 97
this day begins with Clear and Pleasant weather from the South heading by the wind S. E. at day light got up tackle and brock out shoos and Cooper employed sitting up at 1 P. M. took in the W. Boat and put weather one out at 6 P. M. spoke Mary J. Simmons and Capt. Meandley came on board at 3:30 P. M. when they were latter part light breeze took in all the light sails so ends.

Wednesday August 25: 1897
This day begins with Clear and Pleasant Calm weather not breeze wind 2 sails in sight and the water employed ships duty and Cooper sitting up shoos at 1 P. M. Capt. Enos wants on board of Mary J. Simmons at 6 P. M. came back again, middle and latter part the same so ends.

Thursday August 26: 97
This day begins with light breeze from S. E. heading by the wind N. by E. After black first the watch employed taking down fore gallant sail and Erid and Mast at 4 P. M. finished and watch of decks one steamer in sight so ends.

Friday August 27: 97
this day begins with light breeze from the S. E. heading N. by E. in the all sail out and the watch employed ships duty middle and latter part Calm at sun down took in all the sail at 4 P. M. washed of decks one sail in sight so ends
