

Bark Alfred Gibbs bound On a
Remarks Tuesday May 24th 1870

Strong winds from S.W. at 11 A.M. left
the Robert and went on board and got
under way to beat out of the Bay,
chance shot against wind and tide so
ends

Remarks Wednesday May 25th
Begins with strong winds from S.W.
beating out of the Bay, at 4 P.M. wind and
tide too strong gave it up and returned
to anchor off Clarke's Point, and lay there
until 5 P.M. then got under way again.
At noon the wind hauled to the S. having
been all the fore noon from the N.E. and set in
fog. Anchored again four miles below the
distance light. So ends.

Remarks Thursday May 26th
Begins with high air from the S.W.
and a thick fog. The Bark at anchor
four miles below the distance light.
Middle part calm and foggy. Latter part
took a light breeze from N.E. cleared
off; at 4 A.M. took the anchor for the
third time. at noon Lat 41-00.

Remarks Friday May 27th
Begins with moderate breezes from N.E.
calm S. at 3 P.M. set in fog and began to
breeze on. at 6 P.M. took in Bap. Ball sails.
at 8 double reefed the Bap. Sails.
Latter part a Gale from E.N.E. and
thick. at 6 A.M. took in the fore sail
and fore Bap. sail and have too.
Heard to the S.E. at noon let up
a little got a Latitude

Remarks Saturday May 28th 1870.
Begins with a Gale of Wind from E.N.E.
Bark lying too under double reefed main Bap.
Sail. at 4 P.M. close reefed the main Bap. sail.
heading to the S.E. Latter wind hauled to the
N.W. and moderated. made sail. weather
still thick. Barometer 29 1/100

Lat 38-20 Long 71-15

Remarks Sunday May 29th 1870.
Begins with moderate breezes from
the westward and thick weather
with a heavy swell. steering S.W. saw
Schauer Sophie of steering to
the N. Barometer 29 7/10 Latter part
strong winds from the S. and squally
with thunder and lightning. Double
reefed the Bap. Sails. Charles Anthony Sick.
He is stone blind. he says that he had an
attack four years ago and was blind six
months in Chelsea Hospital. Latter part
strong winds from the S. heading E.S.E.

Remarks Monday May 30th
Strong winds from S. and squally
heading E.S.E. saw Bui. & Boats.
Lat 37-26 Long 66-30

Remarks Tuesday May 31st
Begins with strong winds from
the S. under double reefed. heading
to the eastward. at 7 P.M. wore
ship to the westward. Latter part
moderate. heading to the westward.
Employed getting ready for whaling and fitting
the ship. I am very near sick. I
have a very bad cough. I got cold in
the fog before we got off the coast.
two days getting out of the Bay.
