Remarks Sunday May 14th 1871
Begins with strong wind from W. N. W. and
spalls. Spoke the Vulcan. Latter part fresh
breezes. Steering to the E. ward. at noon the
Island bearing N. W. Dist 8 miles

Lat 33-50 Long 80-30

Remarks Monday May 15th
Begins with fresh breezes from W. heading
E. N. E. at sundown luffed too. Both head yards
back. Latter part moderate breezes from the East
Employed repairing the main top sail, that we split
off Cape Horn.

Lat 33-32

Remarks Tuesday May 16th
Begins with moderate breezes from N. E. heading
by to the Eastward. Latter part fresh breezes from
N. N. W. Juan in sight bearing N. E. Dist 15 miles

Lat 33-53

Remarks Wednesday May 17th
Begins with fresh breezes and squalls from N. W.
at 6 P. M. Juan bearing W. by compass Dist 15 miles.
Latter part strong winds from N. W. under close
reefed top sails. Land bearing W. Dist 30 miles.

Lat 33-52

Remarks Thursday May 18th
Begins with strong winds from W. by S.
Heading to the S. under close reef. Latter part light
breezes from the N. E. saw Pin. Rocks and black fish.

Lat 34-08 L.

Remarks Friday May 19th
Begins with light breezes from N. E. saw
Pin. Rocks. Latter part moderate breezes from
E. reefed up three standing sails. One lower. One
top mast and one top gallant.

Lat 34-35 Long 78-05

Remarks Saturday May 20th
Begins with moderate breezes from E. saw
Campanas. Latter part light air from S. E.
saw Black Rock.

Lat 34-31 Long 77-57

Bark Alfred Gibbs Cruising S. of Juan Fernandez

Remarks Sunday May 21st 1871
Begins with light air from Eastward and calm.
saw cut-squid, and porpoises. they was so far
off that we could not make them out. Calm
and near night. Could not get to them.

Middle part strong winds from N. W. to S. W.
with heavy squalls of rain. at 1 P. M. took in the
fore top sail. Latter part a gale from S. W.
at 9 P. M. close reefed the main top sail
Ship head to the S. E. at 11 the wind began
to back to the Westward and blow harder.

Lat 34-25

Remarks Monday May 22nd
Begins with a Gale from W. S. W. and
increasing. heavy squalls of wind and rain.
have too head to the South. at 4 P. M. wore
Ship to the N. W. and took in the fore top
mast stay sail, and main spencer. Squalls
very heavy. at 6 P. M. barometer 29- $\frac{15}{100}$
at 7 P. M. wind began to haul back to Southward
and blow very heavy. shipped a sea and
stove the fore boat. dropped a men and c.
Latter part a Gale from the S. W. put off
N. and set double reef and fore sail.

Lat 33-23 Long 77-22

Remarks Tuesday May 23rd
Begins with a Gale from S. W. but moderates
course N. by E. under double reef and
fore sail. at 6 P. M. took in fore sail
and fore top sail and luffed too head
to the Westward. Latter part moderate
breezes from W. steering N. W. Employed
repairing the fore house, and making it larger.
got stove in the fore last.

Lat 32-30 Long 78-31
