Remarks Saturday May 10th 1873
Begins with light air and calm. The
air baffling from S E to S W. at 7 P M a little
more steady. Course E. all drawing sail set.
Barometar 29.8/10 Thermameter 40°. Latter
part light air from the Westward, and
slowly hauling to the Northward. Barometar
29.8/10 Thermameter 42° Lat 56-23 Long 73-20

Remarks Sunday May 11th
Begins with light air from the Westward
and slowly hauling to the Northward.
at 7 P M wind N N E very light.
Course E. Barometar 29.75/100 Thermameter
42°. Middle part moderate gradually hauling
to the Eastward. Latter part fresh breezes
at noon E N E heading of E. No change
Barometar 29.3/10 Thermameter 38°

Remarks Monday May 12th
Begins with fresh breezes from E to E S E.
and bag squalls. heading by to the Southward
at 5 1/2 P M we are ship to the N E.
under Cap. sails & courses. at
Barometar 29.2/100 Thermameter 37°
Middle part light air and calm.
Latter part light air and calm. air
baffling from S E. to N. and a heavy
irregular swell. Barometar 28.8/10 Thermameter
42° Lat 57-32 Long 72-26

Remarks Tuesday May 13th
Begins with light air from the N and
a drizzling rain. Not wind enough to steer.
against the swell. the wind slowly hauling
to the Eastward. at 6 P M wind E by S. and
drizzling rain. Saw a sail trying to get to the
Eastward. Barometar 28.8/10 Thermameter 42°.
Middle part light air from S. Course E N E.
Latter part moderate breezes from S S W. two
sails in sight heading to the Eastward. thick
weather. Barometar 28.85/100 Thermameter 40°
Lat 57-22 Long 69-23

Remarks Wednesday May 14th 1873.

Begins with moderate breezes from S W.
Course N E, all drawing sails set. weather
thick with drizzling squalls of rain. Two
sails in company steering to the Eastward.
Barometar 28.85/100 Thermameter 40°.
Our passenger quite sick. he has the Asthma
very bad. I am afraid if we do not get
into warmer weather soon, he will not stand
it long. Latter part moderate breezes from
N W. Barometar 28.9/10 Thermameter 40°
Lat 57-06 Long 66-30

Remarks Thursday May 15th
Begins with moderate breezes from N W
with hail and snow squalls. at 4 1/2 P M
took a heavy squall from N W by W. took
in royal & Cap. Gull sails. Squalls still
continued to come heavy. Double reefed
Cap sails. at 8 P M wind N W.
Course N E by N. One sail in sight.
the other was run out of sight of.
Barometar 28.85/100 Thermameter 38°
Middle part squally from N W. Latter
part wind N. heading E N E. two sails in
sight. Barometar 28.6/10 Thermameter 33°.
Lat 56-04 Long 63-10

Remarks Friday May 16th
Begins with moderate breezes from N.
heading E N E. at 4 P M wind hauled to the
S W by W. in a snow squall. Bessel under
single reefed Cap. sails. Barometar 28.6/10 Thermameter
33°. Middle part strong winds from W. S W.
and heavy snow squalls. At 12 midnight called
all hands to shorten sail. put her under double
reefed main Cap. sail. Close reefed fore and
fore sail. at 9 A M the side sea being so
heavy we have too much close reefed main Cap.
sail. passed a sail have too. Barometar 28.6/10
Thermameter 40. Lat 54-54 Long 59-50
