

Sunday July 27th 1857
Commences with fresh breezes from the S.W. and thick weather. Middle part light air from the South and calm spoke Ship Lagoda of R.B. 400 sp. Latter light baffling air from the South and thick fog so ends the Land in sight

Monday July 28th Commences with light baffling air from the South and thick fog. Middle part fresh breezes from the S.W. Latter strong breezes and thick weather and very rugged so ends the Land in sight about 12 miles dist

Tuesday July 29th Commences with strong breezes from the S.W. and thick rainy weather. Middle part the same. Latter a gale of wind so ends 4 Ships in sight

Wednesday July 30th Commences with a gale of wind from the S.W. and cloudy weather. Middle part the same with rain. Latter more moderate with a plenty of rain so ends

Thursday July 31st Commences with fresh breezes from the S.W. and thick fog and rain. Middle part strong breezes. Latter more moderate with rainy thick weather so ends

Friday August 1st Commences with fresh breezes from the Eastward and foggy weather. Middle part wind S.W. and a rain storm. Latter the same so ends

Saturday August 2nd Commences with strong breezes from the S.W. and rainy. Middle part more moderate with tolerable good weather. The first we have had for 12 days. Latter fine breezes from the S.W. and cloudy weather so ends 2 Ships in sight

Sunday August 3rd 1857
Commences with fine breezes from the S.W. and thick foggy weather. Spoke Ship Catharine of R. London 1000 lbs. Middle part moderate breezes from the S.W. and good weather. Close in with the Ice at 4 A.M. saw several Whales going quiet towards the Ice covered and chased. Latter part strong breezes and a thick rain storm. Spoke Ship Commodore of Distury 750 lbs. (1000 sp) Lat by Account 14° 45'

Monday August 4th Commences with strong breezes from the S.W. and thick and rainy just away to the South, at 3 P.M. pointed ourselves amongst the Ice, tucked ship to clear the Ice, fog cleared up saw the Ice to the S.W. as far as the eye could see, and about 10 miles to the S.W. commenced beating to the windward to clear the Ice at 11 P.M. got to the windward of the Ice. Middle part fresh breezes from East and cloudy weather heading S.E. at 5 A.M. no Ice in sight, steering south. Latter part fine breezes from S.W. and squalls of fog so ends. Lat by Account 15° 20'

Tuesday August 5th Commences with fresh breezes from the S.W. and thick fog. Middle part light breezes from the S.W. and cloudy weather. at 1 P.M. saw a plenty of Ice off the Leeward. Latter light breezes and squalls of fog and rain so ends Lat by Account 16° 50'

Wednesday August 6th Commences with light air from the S.W. and squalls of fog and rain. Middle part good weather. Latter wind headed to the Westward and cloudy weather so ends Lat by Account 17° 50'
