

Remarks Sunday May June 6th 1841
 Begins with heavy dirty weather. Hooped some
 oil. at 4 P.M. washed off fore and aft, at dark
 off the North part of Charles Island standing
 West by South. At Noon Lat 1.16 South

Remarks Monday June 7th 1841
 Commences with light trades
 and rainy weather. Steering to the West. I sail
 to the Southward. At sunset South head bore
 N.W. distant 20 miles. In the morning stood in
 shore and lowered 2 boats to go ashore.

Remarks Tuesday June 8th 1841
 Fresh trades and fair. Lying
 off and on at South head. Cape Christopher. At
 dark the boats returned on board. with some
 half dozen Serapen. squared in the yards steering
 South West by South. A.M. Commences breaking
 out. Lat 1.55 South Long by Chron 92.27 West

Remarks Wednesday June 9th 1841
 Begins with fresh breezes. and
 fair. saw breeches ran off proved to be serapen.
 Employed in stowing down in the fore hold. At sunset
 took in the Topgallant sails. steering S.W. by South
 Latter part employed in stowing oil. in the fore
 hold. 3.21 South.

Remarks Thursday June 10th 1841
 Fresh trades and fair. Continue
 stowing down, some flying fish in sight. Latter parts
 much the same. nothing seen worth noticing.
 Lat 2.45 South Long 95.54 West

Ship Hector on the western Ground

 Remarks Friday June 11th 1841
 Fresh trades and for the most
 part fair weather. Steering S.W. by South under Top
 sails. finished stowing and washed off decks
 before dark. Thru men below 2 with sore shins
 and 1 with a lame leg. all the rest in the good
 old time. At daylight washed off and set
 maintopgallant sail Lat 3.39 South Long 98.05 West

Remarks Saturday June 12th 1841
 These 24 hours first fresh
 trades and fair. steering W. by South. at dark
 took in the main topgallant sail and doubled
 reefed the the topsails. A.M. made sail
 Lat 5.23 South

Remarks Sunday June 13th 1841
 Begins with fresh trades and
 fair. squally. Employed in doing various
 small jobs. At dark doubled reefed and
 Luffed to on the N.E. tack. In the morning
 made sail to the south. 2 ships to Seward
 Lat 5.25 South Long 100.06 West

Remarks Monday June 14th 1841
 Begins with fine trades and
 fair weather. A small shoal of whales off the
 Le bow. At 4 P.M. Lowered M.P.S. R.P.S.

Remarks Monday June 14th 1841
 Strong trades and cloudy
 very rough sea. At 1 P.M. tacked to the N.E.
 at dark shortened sail heading South. at 9 A.M.
 raised whals and lowered. but did not strike
 returned on board Lat 6.01 South
