

Thursday July 5

Begins with fresh breeze from S.E. ship
under whole top sails over the tacks
of the wind. Gained with the Mynera Smith
of New Bedford & Barker Pearl of New London
Middle part wind to the Eastward
Latter part N.E. ship on Starboard tack
heading N by W. watch variously employed.
Sailed.

Lat by Meridian Altitude 19° 12' S
Long by Chronometer 118° 00' E

Friday July 6

Begins with a strong breeze from
S.E. ship under whole top sails & continued
steering S.W. & ship in sight. Middle
& latter part thick with rain ship on
utter tack by the wind several sails in
sight. Sailed.

Saturday July 7

Begins with thick overcast weather from
Eastward ship by the wind on Starboard tack
heading S.E. several sails in sight. Middle
and gained with the Mynera Smith of
New Bedford. Middle & latter part moderate
steering S.E. & in evening wind to the Mynera
Smith Sailed.

Lat by Meridian Altitude 19° 00' S
Long by Chronometer 118° 17' E

Sunday July 8

Begins with fine pleasant weather from N.E. ship
with all sail set steering & gained with the
Mynera Smith. Middle & latter part moderate
all sail set steering S.E. Made the Land at 11 the
N.E. Coast of New Holland Sailed.

Lat by Meridian Altitude 20° 07' S
Long by Chronometer 118° 22' E

Monday July 9

Begins with a moderate overcast weather
from Westward steering from S. to E. all sail
set in evening with the Mynera Smith
at 3 P.M. the mate Mr. Pease came
aboard off duty.

Middle part a brisk breeze from S.E. by N
ship under short sail by the wind on different tacks
in about 13 & 14 fathoms water through the night
latter part strong breeze from the S.E. by N ship on the
Starboard tack working in shore so ends this day

Ship lying to anchor under Starboard side

Tuesday July 10

Begins with moderate breeze from the S.E. with all sail
set standing on different tacks in 12 & 13 fathoms of water come
to at 2 O'clock A.M. anchored in 12 fathoms of water
found two ships lying to anchor the ship Splendid and
the Bark Astoria & latter part strong breeze from
the S.E. Ship lying to anchor two whales seen so ends
this day
