Came with strong breeze and squalls of rain got our share of oil from the Bark Permelia five casks and a wine of which was twenty five lbs sparrow at half past two see three sails was gaming at three o'clock. No. 1000 ship and stood near them they were the Bark America and the ship Dover and the ship Brunswick thirteen months out two hundred sparrow and one hundred of whale maddole part winds from the same and the whether the same ship heading S. under short sail latter part strong breeze from S.E. employed in various jobs ship heading on the back with three sails in one of those is a stranger so ends this twenty four hours

Saturday December 15. 1860

Came with strong breeze from S.E. employed in ship duty ship heading E.N.E. under short sail at half past three keep off for the Bark Permelia and spoke her then kept off for the ship Brunswick and had a short game at half past six woods ship standing to the southward Middle part wind the same and the whether the same latter part more moderate breeze from E.S.E. ship heading by the wind under short sail rather lowery a few drops of rain employed in stowing down a fare of oil with one sail in sight so ends this twenty four hours

No Observation

Sunday December 16. 1860

Came with moderate breeze from S.E. by E. ship heading by the wind on either tack rather lowery with a few drops of rain employed in stowing down a fare of oil down the after hold at three o'clock finished at five o'clock gamed with the Bark Permelia at sundown took in the fore tops ship heading E.S.E. Middle part wind the same whether the same latter part moderate breeze from E. at half past seven o'clock keep the ship off N.W. N. employed in sorting ship with one merchantman ship in sight steering to the Westward also the Bark Permelia at half past eight luffed top and shortened sail heading N.N.E.

Monday December 17. 1860

Came with light breeze from E. ship steering N.W. by N. employed in ship duty one sail in sight at one o'clock A.M. raised a white letter but it broke to the further at half past six luffed to the wind and shortened sail ship heading N.N.E. Middle part wind the same whether the same latter part wind from E.S.E. light breeze at half past eight P.M. keep the ship off N.W. by N. employed in ship duty one merchant ship in sight bound to the Westward also the Bark Permelia so ends this twenty four hours

Tuesday December 18. 1860

Came with light breeze from E.S.E. ship steering N.W. by N. employed in sundry jobs at half past three luffed to by the wind heading N.E. and at four o'clock A.M. luffed ship for the Bark Permelia at six o'clock A.M. luffed ship again and stood to at Boatman on board and stayed a few moments also we shortened sail heading N.E. Middle and latter wind the same at five o'clock P.M. keep the ship off N.W. by N. employed in sending up a new main Ropes Backstay a other jobs with one sail in sight so ends

Wednesday December 19. 1860

Came with light breeze from E. by S. ship steering N.W. by N. employed in ship duty the Bark Permelia in sight at half past six A.M. luffed to by the wind to the wind with mail yard abaft Middle part wind and whether the same latter part light breeze from E. at five P.M. keep the ship off N.W. by N. employed in ship duty one sail in sight so ends.
