Came with a fresh Breeze from S.E. to S. the weather quite clear the ship lying to Anchor in St. Helena employed in painting ship a number of Marchant ships passing by Middle & Latter part Wind and weather the same latter part employed in painting and stowing down Waller and other small boats the ship being thick with Birds off New London from Desolation island Call bound Home one Watch on liberty so ends this twenty four hours,

Lying to Anchor

Sunday March 3th 1861

Came with strong Breeze from S.E. ship lying to Anchor in St. Helena with one watch on liberty employed in clearing up decks one ship came to day the ship William Baggar of New Bedford Capt Macfabe, with eight hundred sparrows and whale Middle and latter part wind and weather the same one Watch on liberty about forty five Marchant ships passed this twenty four hours so ends,

Lying to Anchor

Monday March 4th 1861

Came with fresh Breeze from S.E. the ship lying to Anchor in the harbor of St. Helena with one Watch of on liberty Middle & Latter part Wind and weather the same employed in stowing down Waller in the Barber room and painting there was thirty Marchant ships past and twenty came to Anchor so ends this twenty four hours,

Lying to Anchor

Tuesday March 5th 1861

Came with strong Breeze from S.E. the ship lying to Anchor in the harbor of St. Helena employed in a few small jobs about ship Middle & Latter part Wind the same employed in sending up fore and Mizzen Royal & Masts & other small jobs about ship so ends this twenty four hours,

Lying to Anchor

Wednesday March 6th 1861

Came with fresh Breeze from S.E. the ship lying to Anchor in the harbor of St. Helena employed in sending up the main Royal yard and having about some twenty Marchant ships passing Middle & Latter part wind and weather much the same about eight o'clock P.M. got the ship under way and stood off shore two or three miles and came to on the starboard tack with fore yard aback the Captain and Went on shore this twenty four hours finishes with ship lying off and on so ends,

Lying off and on.

Thursday March 7th 1861

Came with a fresh Breeze from S.E. by S. the weather rather squally the ship under way lying off and on the island of St. Helena at two o'clock P.M. the Capt came on board and went around on the starboard tack heading E by N. sun ship the tops are up and barres and sail set again in eight Middle part wind and weather the same the ship under short sail at five o'clock Wore ship heading S.E. by W. Latter the weather equally the wind from the same employed in Coopers Oyl and Ship duty long in sight being W. Most the time about twenty Miles distant no sail in sight so ends this twenty four hours,
