

Wednesday July 20th 1836

Continues Light winds and fine weather steering by the wind to the S, E, at sundown shortened sail Middle and Latter Parts

calm saw nothing remarkable so Enes
Lats -- 17^o 40 South Long By (D, R) -- 117^o 00 East

Thursday July 21st 1836

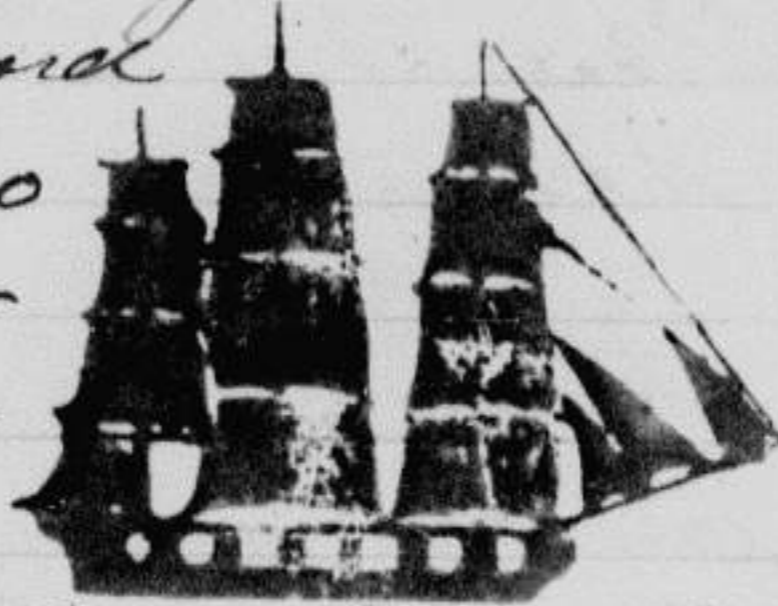
Continues calm and fine warm weather Saw Grampass Middle Part much the same Latter Part Light winds and fine weather steering to the S, and East so Enes Lats -- Long --

Friday July 22nd 1836

Continues Light winds and pleasant weather steering to the S, and East Saw nothing of note Middle Part much the same steering to the East Latter parts squally with rain so Enes Lats -- Long --

Saturday July 23rd 1836

Commenced strong Breezes and cloudy weather steering by the wind to the South and East at 4 P.M. Sounded found no Bottom at 5 P.M. saw a ship at 7 P.M. spoke her Ship Russell New Bedford Capt Gifford with 2100 lbs of sperm Oil Middle and Latter Parts Light winds so Enes Lats By Obs -- 17^o 40 South Long -- 118^o 12 East -



Sunday July 24th 1836

Continues Light winds and fine weather at 1 P.M. spoke the Russell again and went on Board and got 24 barrels of Beef 8 tbs Pork 8 Co. flour 3 Do Bread iron hoops Rice 124 Gallons Molasses Boards &c. Middle and Latter Parts much the same so Enes there 24 hours Lats By Obs -- 17^o 46 South Long By (D, R) 117^o 30 E.

Monday July 25th 1836

Continues winds from the South and East with pleasant weather steering to the S, and West Middle and Latter Parts much the same at 11 A.M.

Saw a school of Black fish (Down two Boats and got 2 of them along side and hoisted them in so Enes Lats 18^o 23 South Long By (D, R) 117^o 00 East

Tuesday July 26th 1836

Continues strong Breezes from the S, and East with passing Clouds steering by the wind to the S, and West Middle parts Light winds with Rain Latter Part calm the watch employed in Boiling the Black fish so Enes Lats By Obs -- 18^o 15 South Long By (D, R) --

Wednesday July 27th 1836

Commenced strong Breezes and cloudy weather Middle and Latter Part Light winds from the East so Enes there 24 hours Lats By Obs -- 18^o 06 South Long --

Thursday July 28th 1836

Continues Light winds from the East with fine Pleasant weather Middle and Latter Parts Much the same so Enes Lats 18^o 00 South Long.

Friday July 29th 1836

Continues Light winds and fine weather; this day hauled up the whale Bone Middle and Latter parts much the same so Enes Lats By Obs -- 17^o 48 South Long -- 115^o 00 East

Saturday July 30th 1836

Continues Light winds from the S, East with fine Pleasant weather at 1 P.M. Saw a school of sperm whales (Down Boats Starboard and Waiste Boats struck and killed and took them along side and set the watch Middle and Latter Parts much the same at Day Light commenced cutting at meridian finished so Enes Lats By Obs -- 17^o 24 South Long By (D, R) 115^o 22 East
