 the 4 miles saw her five miles

in a whorl, soon once a hour
 On Monday August 13.
 The first part of the day began with light winds
 from the North and soon a squall of rain and hail
 towing the whorls tow the ship at 6 PM anchored the
 whorls and again in some wind fresh from the South
 much foot more moderate. Later part fine weather as
 I got one whorl tow the ship and began cutting it
 off. We took our anchor and moved the ship tow the
 whorl at 11 AM tow anchor and tow the whorl tow the
