

May Wednesday 18<sup>th</sup> 1831  
the first part of these 24 hours Commences with  
a Gale of wind from the North & bying to S.E.  
and middle part much the same weather & at 5 P.M.  
more moderate & Set the fore & main topsail at 7 P.M.  
Saw & Sail insight S.E. at 11 P.M. made all Sail S.E.  
and Set in by Chb. L. on S.E. South Wind  
Long in 34.07 West Long in S.E. S.E.

Thursday May 19<sup>th</sup> 1831  
the first part of these 24 hours Commences with  
more doct weather & large S.E. & Course S. S. E. and  
a pretty variation westerly which makes S. E. course  
S.E. at half past 1 P.M. Saw the land one of the  
western islands called Flores or rather I would of  
Sear Carver and at 6 P.M. fished the fore & main  
topsail & by to all night to the westward of the island  
S.E. and middle part Strong breezes from the N.W. S.W.  
S.W. S.E. at 5 P.M. made Sail & stood a long shore  
of the island of Flores S.E. at 7 P.M. Shook over  
Course for Fayall and Soends these 24 hours running down  
between Flores & the island of Fayall Course S.E. by S.  
and winds N. W. S.E. S.E.

Friday May 20<sup>th</sup>  
the first part of these 24 hours Commences with pleasant  
weather and the watch employed in Ship's Duty and Course  
for Fayall S. E. by S. at 8 P.M. took in Sail and ran  
under 3 topsails S.E. and middle part fresh breezes from the  
S. W. S.E. at daylight we were in close with the  
land of Fayall and at 8 P.M. spoke the Ship Captain  
of Hobbsdon S.E. and all hand employed in working  
out between decks and Soends these 24 hours in between the  
island of Pico and St. George S.E. S.E.

Saturday May 21<sup>st</sup>  
the first part of these 24 hours Commences with strong  
breezes of wind from the West and a standing out  
from between the island to the N. N. W. S.E.

and at 8 P.M. double reefed topsails & in S.E. S.E. at  
10 P.M. closed reefed fore & main topsail and middle part  
fished them S.E. at 11 P.M. Calms & rain at 8 P.M.  
a breeze from the N. W. & made Sail S.E. and  
latter part of these 24 hours ends with pleasant weather and  
in under the island of Fayall and Soends this day

Sunday May 22<sup>nd</sup> the first part of these  
24 hours Commences with pleasant weather and the watch  
employed in Ship's Duty and winds from the west S.E.  
at 5 P.M. a rain squall & fished topsails and reefed  
topsails and then more moderate S.E. and middle part squally  
and latter part of these 24 hours much the same  
weather & the land insight in. Set in by Chb. L.  
38.47 North S.E. S.E.

Monday May 23<sup>rd</sup> 1831  
the first part of these 24 hours Commences  
with strong breezes from the N. W. S.E. S.E.  
and middle part much the same weather squally weather S.E.  
at 1 P.M. fished the fore & main topsail and at  
7 P.M. Saw a brig standing down for the land  
and the land insight bearing about E. by N. S.E.  
and middle part Squally & some rain S.E. at 2 P.M.  
fished the fore & main topsail at 3 P.M. were Ship and  
stood to the North & East & at 7 P.M. much the  
same weather as before & a brig insight standing towards  
the land S.E. and latter part of these 24 hours ends much  
the same weather. Squally & some rain S.E. S.E.

Tuesday May 24<sup>th</sup> the year 1831  
the first part of these 24 hours Commences with a  
moderate Gale of wind from the N. W. S.E. under  
double reef main topsail & fore sail S.E. and at  
1 P.M. the land insight S.E. bearing E. by S. S.E.  
and middle part blowing & raining and more ship S.E. at 6  
P.M. fogal insight bearing E. S. E. and ran down  
for the land and Soends these 24 hours a running a  
long down the land S.E. S.E.
