Thursday August the 11th Day the 1831
the first part of these 24 hours commenced with a Gale of
wind from the North & west close in with the land and
in company with the Shipwreck of Scarborough and the
Ship Julius Caesar of Newcastle on Tyne and middlepart blow-
ing a Gale of wind from the N.W. at 6 Am
all hands landed & labors & light winds at 8 Am and
at 9 got the log work under way & the land insight & 2
Ships & L. and Sounds these 24 hours hoiling Oil & light winds.

Friday August the 12th Day & L.
these 24 hours commenced with all hands employed in
hoiling Oil and light winds from the S.E. and standing in
for the land at 8 Am the watch employed in hoiling Oil & L.
and middlepart fresh breeze from the South & thick weather
at 7 Am the watch cancelled and finished hoiling Oil
and light winds from the S.W. and in company with
the Ship Stephany & close in with the land at 8 Am
the Capt. & Mate went on Shore for potatoes and so-
unds these 24 hours with the boats a Shore and light winds
from the west and pleasant weather & L. & L.

Saturday August the 13th Day
the first part of these 24 hours commenced with pleasant wea-
ther and lying off & on the land and 2 boats a Shore at 2.
Am the boats came on board with potatoes & L. and middle-
part blowing strong from the S.W. and thick weather
at 4 Am all hands landed and blowing strong from the South and off the
Isle off. In evening an thick drizzly weather and sounds & L.

Sunday August the 14th Day
the first part of these 24 hours commenced with
a Gale of wind from the North and thick weather
at 3 Am more Ship and stood to the north and
east & L. at 6 Am much the same winds and weather & L.
at 1 Am close in with the land of insupportable & thick rain
at 6 Am all hands under mad sail washed off.

Ship Hercules of Newcastle & L.

Docks & L. at 10 Am. Saw whales & lived a way
the boats but did not get the whale and in company
with the Ship Julius Caesar of Newcastle on Tyne
and Sounds these 24 hours lying to winds from the

Monday August the 15th Day
the first part of these 24 hours commenced with a Gale of
wind and lying to under the lee of the island & L. at 6.
Am reefed the fore sail & blowing strong from
the N.W. & L. and middlepart a Gale of wind from the
N.W. at 6 Am more mad sail and latter
part pleasant weather and close in under the Island
of Knightengale and Sounds these 24 hours & L. & L.

Tuesday August the 16th Day
the first part of these 24 hours commenced with plea-
sant weather and light winds from the N.W. & L.
and saw a Grate plenty of whales and lived away
the boats and got part 1 with the west boat
and after some time killed the whale and got
him along Side at 8 Am but being raged lost
him a gain and could not reef the topsails and
middlepart light winds from the west and laying off
and in the & L. at 2 Am a Gale of wind from the S.W.
at 6 Am all hands landed and blowing & raining & L.
at 11 Am more mad sail and found our Whales that
we lost 12 hours before and got him along Side and
Sounds these 24 hours winds from the S.W. by us

Wednesday August the 17th Day
the first part of these 24 hours commenced with strong
winds from the S.W. by W. and all hands employed
in taking in the the whale at 2 Am got him well
secured the whale well with fluke ropes but the
boiling strong and close in with the land of knighten-
gale at 6 Am concluded to lay with the whale a long
Side all night if we will please & L. and middlepart
