

Friday July the 14. 1837

first part of these 24 hours commences with strong breezes from the N & Course S E.

At 5 P.M. Passed a Bark Ship Steering N.W. Saw several finbacks At 12 Midnight the wind shifted to the S.E. At Day Light Tacked ship and Healed N.E. by the wind Latter Part.

Saw several sail in sight so ended Latter Part.

Saturday July the 15. 1837

first Part of these 24 hours commences with Cloudy weather wind from S.E. Healed N.E. by East

an the wind At P.M. Saw a brig Steering N.W. at 3 p.m. boarded us and got two casks

of water having a light passage had got short of water her name was the Kimbury packet

of Kimbury bound to Baltimore At 4 P.M. began to rain Latter Part rugged look on

top gallant sails and single reef the topsails so ends this twenty four hours 40. 00 N. Long 41. 00 West

Sunday July the 16. 1837

first part tacked ship and soon raised whales going quick to the windward and soon got out of sight at P.M. saw a large whale under our

our lee back the main topsail and lowered low boats and chased him to the windward came

on foggy and lost sight of him at 3 P.M. tacked ship to the southward and eastward

at 12 midnight the wind hauled to the north made all sail and steered S. by S as a course.

There continues foggy so ends no obs. today

Monday July the 17. 1837

these 24 hours begins with light winds and foggy weather wind to the westward steering S by S.

as a course with all sail set to the best advantage at Light saw 2 sails ahead standing to the S.E.

Latter part clear and moderate so ends At 4. 00 25 North Long 38. 25 West

Tuesday July the 18. 1837

first part of these 24 hours fine and pleasant breezes from the S.E. all sail set to the best

advantage at 7 P.M. came up with in 2 miles of the lead ship set our coils but they did

not answer them at 12 midnight came up with him and spoke him found him to be

the shiplock of fair haven capt. tubor 17 days out bound to the western islands at day light saw

him a bout 6 miles a stern at 8. 00 spoke the big Charleston packet 58 days from New Bedford

with 50 barrels of sperm oil latter part wind and weather continues fine and pleasant so ends

Latt. 37. 40 North Long 34. 50 West

Monday July the 19. 1837

first part commences with fine and pleasant breezes from the S.W. course S.E. Middle

and latter part same north of 30 the wind wind hauled more to the south and took

in main top gallant sail and braced sharp the yards heading our course on the wind

with all sail set so ends these 24 hours Latt. 32. 38 North Long 33. 00 West

Thursday July the 20. 1837

first part of these 24 hours fine and pleasant weather wind from the S.W. all sail

set to the best advantage at P.M. saw a ship to the leeward whaling kept of in company with

the shiplock and run down within two miles of the whales and lowered our boats and chased

till dark with out any success we came on board and the captain went on board of the

shiplock and spent the evening with the part wind and weather much the same latter

part same black fish lowered and chased with out any success so ends
