

Wednesday Sept the 27. 1837

These 24 hours commences with moderate and cloudy weather wind east course. E. S. E. watches employed ships duty at 10 P.M. commences a gale of wind from the northward with a heavy sea began to take in sail at midnight it blew a complete gale at day light took in the fore and main topsails sails at 10 A.M. mending under close reef main topsail latter part began to moderate set the fore and main topsails close reef so ends Lat by obs. 32.05 South Long by Chron. 12.20 East

Thursday Sept the 28. 1837

These 24 hours commences with moderate weather and clear a heavy swell all hands employed in making sail at 10 P.M. had all sail set middle part fine and pleasant breeze from the N.W. headed E. S. E. with a strong easterly current latter part watches employed in different jobs about the ship So Ends Lat by obs. 32.10 South Long by Chron. 16.08 East

Friday Sept the 29. 1837

These 24 hours moderate and cloudy weather wind from the S. S. E. headed E. S. E. with all sail set to the best advantage watches employed in ships duty at 5 P.M. a large quantity of porpoises in sight caught 2 of them middle fresh gales double reef the top sails at 3 P.M. began to moderate made sail a gain wind gradually hauling to the northward latter part fine and pleasant so ends Lat by obs. 38.40 South Long by Chron. 18.00 West

Saturday Sept the 30. 1837

All these 24 hours fresh gales from the westward headed E. S. E. with all sail set watches employed in mending sails at 4 P.M. took in main topsail at 5 P.M. middle part calm at 7 A.M. strong breeze from the N. E. headed S. E. by E latter part the wind hauling to the northward and increasing took in fly jib and main royal and quired in the yards So Ends Lat by obs. 32.00 South Long by Chron. 21.15 East

Sunday Oct the 1. 1837

All these 24 hours fresh gales and squally weather wind from the northward headed S. E. by E at 3 P.M. heavy squalls double reef the topsails at P.M. more moderate made sail a gain middle part latter part the weather squally took in fore and main topsails So Ends Lat by obs. 35.36 South Long by Chron. 25.11 East

Monday Oct the 2. 1837

All these 24 hours fresh gales and squally weather wind from the N. W. steering S. E. by E under double reef top sails watches employed in ships duty at 7 P.M. set top gallant sails middle part set studding sails latter part calm with a heavy sea to the S. E. braced the yards and took in studding sails So Ends Lat by obs. 35.34 South Long by Chron. 25.00 West

Tuesday Oct the 3. 1837

All these 24 hours strong gales from the westward at 4 P.M. set studding sails middle part squally too in fly jib and fore and main top gallant sails latter part continues with fresh gales from the N. W. So Ends Lat by obs. 38.50 South Long by Chron. 33.08 East

Wednesday Oct. 4. 1837

These 24 hours commences with fresh gales from the N. W. headed S. E. by E going at the rate of 10 knots an hour watches employed in mending sails at 8 A.M. saw several garres lowered and struck one at 2 P.M. took him along side and commenced cutting So Ends



Lat by obs. 38.53 South Long by Chron. 35.30 East
