

Friday Oct The 13th 1837

These 24 hours commences with strong gales from the N.W. headed east as a course under double reef top sails watches employed in different jobs about the ship at 4 P.M. let the reefs out of the top sails and set the mainsail middle part heavy squalls close reef the top sails latter part continues heavy squalls of hail To Ends Lat by obs. 35. 50 South

Long by Chron. 57. 00 East

Saturday Oct The 14th 1837

These 24 hours commences with heavy squalls from the N.W. heading E by S as a course at 7 P.M. took in all sail and hove the ship too and set the watches back crew at day light set single reef top sails and steering E by S at 10 A.M. saw a ship latter part raised a whale lowered and chased with out any success To Ends Lat by obs. 35. 00 South

Long by Chron. 57. 11 East

Sunday Oct the 15th 1837

These 24 hours commences with strong gales from the N.W. at ship in sight a head at 3 P.M. spoke the ship of fair haven. 3. months out one whale at 1 P.M. took in all sail at day light called all hands and made sail ship in sight of lee beam we raised whales keep of for them and down boats raised whales at 2 A.M. spoke the argentine of harvord greys 3 months out no oil latter part caught a porpoise so end Lat by obs. 34. 59 South Long by Chron. 60. 28 East

Monday Oct The 16th 1837

These 24 hours commences with light winds cloudy weather two ships in sight headed to the S.E. at noon. at 12 raised whales and lowered in company with the argentine with out any success at 3 P.M. the capt came on board and kept company with her through the night at 5 P.M. the capt went on board a gain latter part cloudy so ends

Lat by obs. 35. 40 south Long by Chron. 61. 01 East

Tuesday Oct The 17th 1837

This day commences with cloudy weather wind from the S.E. headed to the southward with all sail set at 2 P.M. saw whales to the windward going quick did not lower at 4 P.M. took in sail and wore ship headed N.E. by E middle part light squalls with rain at 2 A.M. wore ship headed S by S. at day light called all hands and made sail latter part saw whales lowered and chased with out any success To Ends

Lat by obs. 36. 01 South Long by Chron. 61. 30 East

Wednesday Oct the 18th 1837

These 24 hours commences with strong gales and raged weather drove down the topsails and double reef them at 2 P.M. saw whales lowered and struck and drove from him and we lost him at 3 P.M. lowered a gain and chased with out any success even on board and took in all sail for the night blowing a gale from the eastward middle and latter part the gale increased To Ends Lat by obs. 36. 15 South

Long by Chron. 61. 50 East

Thursday Oct the 19th 1837

All these 24 hours a gale of wind saw whales but could not lower middle part began to moderate wore ship to the N.E. at day light made all sail and raised a whale lowered chased with out any success latter part fine and pleasant so end Lat by obs. 36. 10 S. Long by Chron. 61. 51 East

Friday Oct the 20th 1837

These 24 hours commences with cloudy weather wind from the eastward headed to the southward at 7 P.M. took in all sail middle part fresh breezes and cloudy at day light made all sail at 9 A.M. raised whales lowered and fastened to two the mate got stove and was saved over so ends
