These 24 hours commences with fine and pleasant breezes from the S.E. course S. 55. E. middle part latter part continues much the same So Ends

Lat. 10. 10 South
Long 2. 10 West

Friday March the 7 1838

These 24 hours commences with fine and pleasant breezes from the S.E. course S. 55. E. middle part steered S. 55. E. At 10 A.M. made 52 below a head distance 45 miles distance by lunar 53 miles latter part strong breezes So Ends

Lat. 16 40. South
Long 5 00 West

Saturday March the 8 1838

These 24 hours commences with fine breezes from the S.E. watches employed in cleaning away the anchor. at 5 P.M. come to an anchor town harbour middle part saw a ship put away for home latter part the captain went on shore So Ends

March the 9 1838

These 24 hours commences with fine and pleasant weather all hand employed in getting water on board latter part several ships come to anchor So Ends these 24 hours

March the 10. 1838

These 24 hours commences with fine weather at 8 A.M. the starboard watch went on shore liberty for 10 hours So Ends

March the 11. 1838

These 24 hours commences with fine weather watches employed in repairing ships at 8 A.M. the starboard watch has 10 hours liberty on shore So Ends these 24 hours

March the 12 1838

These 24 hours all hand on board for the captain says that if we lay here a month we shall not have any more liberty so we are all on board doing little or nothing So Ends

March the 13. 1838

These 24 hours the captain and mate on shore and we poor cuggars keep on board for nothing success to him So Ends these 24 hours

March the 14. 1838

These 24 hours all hands on board doing nothing middle part the mate and boats crew of a gunning this night the captain stayed on shore So Ends these 24 hours
