

Monday 12th April 1841.
Commences with light winds at 8 AM
Two sperm whales lowered the boats and
got one took him along side at 9 AM
to cut at 1 PM Finished Lat 29-11 S
Long 108-1 E

Tuesday 13th
Commences with light winds & muggy
in Boiling Middle and latter part the same
Lat 28-54 S
Long 107-28 E

Wednesday 14th
Commences with strong winds Middle
and latter part the same

Thursday 15th
Commences with strong winds at 8
AM began to blow down oil at 3 PM
Finished latter part the weather much
the same Lat 29-45 S Long 107-12 E

Friday 16th
Commences with strong winds Middle
and latter part the same Lat 29-35 S
Long 107-22 E

Saturday 17th
Commences with light winds Middle
and latter part Calm Lat 28-20 S
Long 107-55 E

Sunday 18th
Commences with light winds
Middle and latter part the same
Lat 28-10 S Long 107-30 E

Monday 19th
Commences with a strong gale at 1 PM
Hove the ship to under close reef topsails
Middle and latter part the same
Lat 28-30 S Long 107-52 E

Tuesday 20th April 1841.
Commences with strong winds at 4 PM
Two sperm whales lowered the boats
But the ship haled the whale and
soon went out of sight and

Wednesday 21st April
Commences with strong winds Middle
and latter part the same one ship
in sight Lat 28-30 S Long 108-19 E

Thursday 22nd
Commences with strong winds Middle
and latter part the same Lat 28-40 S
Long 107-25

Friday 23rd
Commences with light winds Middle
and latter part the same saw four Barks
Lat 29-34 Long 107-40 E

Saturday 24th
Commences with a strong gale laying
under close reef topsails Middle and
latter part the same Lat 28-11 S
Long 107-54 E

Sunday 25th
Commences with light winds at 8
AM spoke the ship Lucas of New
Bedford with 1400 & 2 PM saw Black
fish toward the boats and got two
Lat 28-54 S Long 108-30 E

Monday 26th
Commences with light winds Middle
and latter part the same Lat 29-2
Long 108-40 E

Tuesday 27th
Commences with light winds at 11 AM
saw two Bails Black fish at 3 PM finished
Middle and latter part fine weather Lat 29-8
Long 107-50 E
