

Ship Hibernia at Sea

July

Thursday the 4th 1844

Light wind from the westward at the recruits
came off to take them on board 170 bushels of potatoes
store thousands of Onions: one hundred of Cabbage
some pumpkins, cawcunbers peaches &c. shipped
one man at 8 P.M. all on board about off shore
at 2 P.M. hoisted aback at 4 P.M. were ship
and heading in sure all hands employed in
stowing away the potatoes &c. Lat 38° 04'

July

Friday the 5th

Light breezes and fine weather head on
different tacks cruising all hands well
content the cables used twice then middle
and latter part fine weather cruising saw 3 sails
off Cape so ends Lat 38° 15'

July

Saturday the 6th

Light breezes from the Northward employed
in ship duty heading for Larak at 7 P.M.
took in the top gallant sails and hoisted
aback at 12 midnight were ship at 3 P.M.
ship ship Pocahontas of Testary 6 weeks
out clean made sail at 8 A.M. squared the
yards steering S.W. wind at 10 P.M. steering
S.E. by S employed in shifting the starboard boat
forward abut so ends Lat 38° 09'

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July

Sunday the 7th

Fresh breezes from the Northward steering
S.E. by S at 7 P.M. took in sail to
enable reefed, topmasts and hoist to the wind
heading to the Eastward middle and latter part
fresh breezes at 10 P.M. saw St Michael's so ends
Lat 38° 38'
Long by Two 76° 08'

July

Monday the 8th

Fresh breezes from the Northward and Eastward
heading on the coast to S.E. at 7 P.M. took
in the main sail at 10 were ship heading on
for the land at 12 midnight hoisted aback at 5 P.M.
made some sail and tacked off shore shipping the
starboard boat davit saw St Mary's and 2 sails
latter part of these 24 hours fresh breezes Lat 38° 15'

July

Tuesday the 9th

Fresh breezes and good weather tacked ship
heading in for St Michael's at 7 P.M. the Stern
bearing S.E. distance 5 miles middle and latter
part light breezes from the Eastward ship heading
to the Northward Larak in sight employed
in shifting the waste boat davits passed a Brig
French so ends Lat 38° 18'
