December 1844

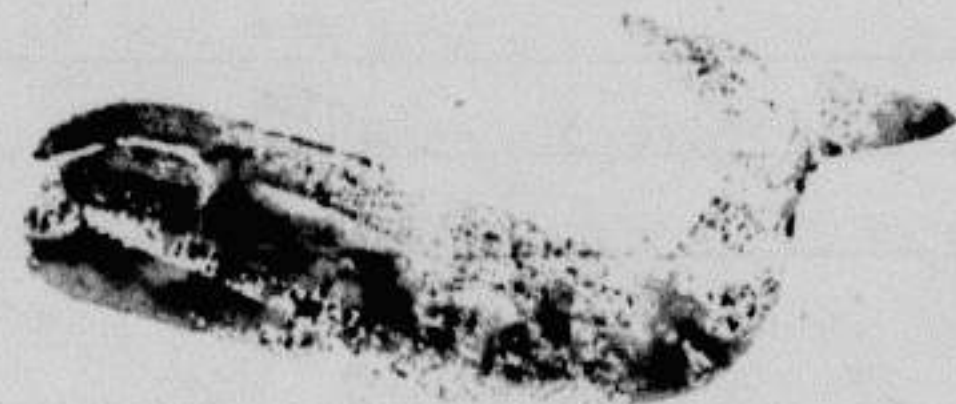
Friday, the 13th

Strong breeze from the westward heading
to the Northward at 10 P.M. finished packing
myself part of my baggage and a light gale
from the westward came & sail and land
was swept over board so early.

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Saturday the 14th

A slight gale cut doubled needed to trail
and get saw plenty of fish backs at 6
P.M. spoke ship Chocazuma at 8
7 whales made first light breezes steering
East ship light commenced backing out to star
board at 7.30. saw whales covered the haul
got one lost & lines took him to the ship
at 11.30 got ready for cutting scene.
? sail in sight



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Sunday the 15th

fresh breeze from W by out in our
whale and took in sail and commenced
sailing at day light got shoal of water
their heading on different tracks and the effect on
cutting no ends this day

Monday the 16th

French breeze ship heading to the southward
Capt. Tower came on board 2 whales yesterday
at 9 AM were ship to the pier & began
employed in, boiling pt 7 AM. Rainy
commenced steaming down strong breeze from
the southwest. Squ. 3 sail.
Mr. Edredge sick with a very sore
finger which was cut with a boat

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Tuesday the 17th

A strong breeze ship under a best sail
heading S.W. Wind shifted & blowing clear
and several sail fair back about land
middle part strong breeze at day night not
doubled fresh & sails heading S.W. at 9
Bell kept off S.E. & S saw 6 sail
Lat 38° 15'

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Wednesday the 18th

Fresh breezes from W & tapering S by E at
 3. Bell spoke with the ship & crew all hands
 3 whales saw the Razer of London Montezuma
 of London and Indian Chief of London 2 or 3 whyle
 each saw the Montezuma and Quercus
 of W. Bedford feeling Quercus 5 whale made
 part a gale from W by N a tapering S by E
 at 7. Bell spoke on the fore sail & crew
 the main & mast with head to W & heavy
 strong steering E & E saw one sail
 Lat 39 13
