

Ship Hibernia at Sea W Coast of P. Simmer

September 1845

Thursday the 4th

Strong breeze from the westward and rugged sea
 plenty whales lowered the boats at 3 P.M. fastened
 the whale run bad, at 6 P.M. had him along
 side and secured for the night. Flock chain
 and fluke rope middle part bad weather at 5 P.M.
 commenced cutting came on to blow could not cut
 took in the main topsail set the mizen stay sail
 blowing fresh with rain saw whales

September 1845

Friday the 5th

A gale from the southward ship heading to
 the Eastward with the whale along side going
 very well at 6 P.M. moderately wind hauled to
 the westward and close reefed main topsail and
 hauled all these 24 hours a gale from S.W.
 to N.W. and a heavy sea

Lat 53° 02

September 1845

Saturday the 6th

Still continues to blow and the whale along
 side middle and latter part the same
 moderating a little the boom gone out of the
 head no ends Lat 54° 32

September 1845

Sunday the 7th

The gale abating fast commenced cutting
 in the whale the whale very much flayed but
 we saved all but the boom and that was
 gone at 6 P.M. finished cutting and
 commenced boiling main sail & steering gear
 middle and latter part fresh breeze
 and rain squalls saw one sail
 and no whales

Lat 55° 16

September 1845

Monday the 8th

A gale from W.N.W. ship heading S.W.
 hauled close reefed main topsail and
 fore sail at 10 P.M. took in the
 main topsail set the mizen stay sail
 employed in boiling middle part
 blowing fresh at 7 P.M. finished boiling
 spoke the Barque Harriet of Boston
 8 whales no ends Lat 55° 00

September 1845

Tuesday the 9th

Light gales and rugged ship heading to
 the Northward and under short sail in company
 with the 50 scraped our boom middle part
 moderated made sail at 8 P.M. saw and heard
 the boat for a right whale without success the
 Harriet's boat was seen the wind fresh we came
 on board a short sail saw Lat
 no ends
