

Ship Hibernia at the S J M Simmons No
November 1845

Tuesday the 4th
Thick rainy weather all hands on board but
the divers employed in getting boats
etc got some things from shore great excitement
in the harbor the ~~Shallies~~ attempted to board
the California but were driven back by the
crew which were maned with muskets, pikes
lances and boarding knives the difficulty is some-
thing about a man not being paid off.
This day got of some paint and oil some cooking
utensils crockery ware stove fuel etc
ship ready for sea but head wind

November 1845
Wednesday the 5th

This day fine with some showers of rain found
Charles Chase on board the Centurion of W. Dickson
he refused to come back sent ashore for the
high sheriff to take him ashore and put him
in the port he removed the ship and hauled
round

Thursday the 6th November 1845

Fine weather at 7 AM the Capt brought the
Cargento off put him in irons he got them
off and got ashore unknown to any one at
Charles Barry taking the anchor at 10 AM the
pilot came on board and made the ship a-c-o-f-f
Capt ashore searching for Cargento at 5 PM brought
him off in irons ship lying off and on Capt ashore
saying about 2 men he shot Henry Simpson and
Thomas Smith which was found to belong to a ship
that has come from Moorea strong breeze through
the night

Friday the 7th Sea Account
Fine trade and good weather ship lying off
and on Capt shore on business several ships
lying off and on

November 1845

Saturday the 8th

Fine weather at 5 PM Capt came on
board kept her off W. S. M. set, 10 PM set
standing sail steering for Onekehew in company
with the Omega of Fairhaven latter part fresh
trade and good weather saw Abori so ends

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Sunday the 9th

Fine trade and good weather in company with
the Omega at 5 PM saw Onekehew middle
part layed aback under short sail at 7 AM
made sail steering for the Island at 12
Meridian line aback Capt went on board the
Omega braced forward looking for a landing
place so ends
