

Tuesday July 12th Remarks on board Ship Kibarra

Fine fair pleasant with a fine breeze from the S.W. ship heading various ways saw plenty of Grampuses watches engaged in various duties latter part pleasant with the wind the same. Lat 38.21 N. Long 29.17 W.

Wednesday July 13th Fine part pleasant with a fine breeze from the N.W. ship heading to the N.E. over the wind saw Grampuses and a sail the Capt feels well but weak latter part weather rather thick and misty with the wind from the N.W. steering to the N.E. all hands engaged in setting up the main and mizen rigging saw grampuses. Lat by Obs 39.39 N.

Thursday July 14th Pleasant with a fine breeze from the N.W. steering to the N.E. with all the topsails clewed down all hands engaged in setting up rigging at 6 A.M. cleared up decks and got supper made in part strong breeze from the N.W. ship and single reefed topsails and courses heading to the N.E. at 7 P.M. it was the last that we did see of Henry Raymond breathing we had five or six men down there with him but they could not do him any good so he died with the will of God after an illness of four weeks and he was a horrible sight to it was supposed that he was poisoned his head and face was all black out and full of holes to the bone we committed his body to the deep at ten minutes past 7 P.M. then hauled forward and stood along on the wind watches engaged in various duties saw nothing Lat 41.39 N.

Friday July 15th Commences with light variable air and calms ship under all sail nothing seen watches engaged in heaving out for dried apples and sundry other things latter part strong breeze from different quarters with rain showers saw a Brig steering to the N.E. watches engaged in scrubbing the decks at 10 P.M. raised a school of whales supposed them to be Spinn Whales we lowered the Boats for them but lost the run of them. No Obs.

Saturday July 16th Commences with pleasant weather and a fine breeze at 2 A.M. came on board and got dinner hauled forward the yards and stood to the Northward under all sail at 1/2 past 2 A.M. raised the whales again and lowered for them they proved to be square headed Grampuses watches engaged in various duties middle and latter part pleasant with a fine breeze from the N.W. ship heading to the N.W. at 10 P.M. raised a large ship steering to the S.E. watches engaged in various duties nothing seen Lat by Obs 44.04 N.

Sunday July 17th Pleasant with light air and calms watches engaged in ships duties nothing seen hoke out 1 cbl of Flour latter part pleasant with light air and calms saw a ship bound to the Westward Lat 44.22 N.

Monday July 18th Commences with light air and calms at 1 A.M. raised a School of Blackfish we lowered the Boats and chased them till 4 A.M. without success and then came on board latter part pleasant with light air from the Southward ship heading to the Eastward saw a ship heading to the S.E. also saw porpoises watches engaged in various duties Lat 44.51 N.
